Before coming to Florida, Mary ventured into politics by volunteering to help Chicago Mayor, Jane Byrne. Her mother worked with the famous political powerhouse, Mayor Richard Daley.

At the age of 26, Mary moved to Florida to become the Comptroller for the City of Hallandale Beach. During the next 6 years, she moved up to Finance Director of the City and also performed work for Dania Beach as their Finance Director.

Mary also sits on the Board of Trustees of Junior Achievement and is a Board member of the Greater Ft. Lauderdale Alliance.

### PARKLAND MASSACRE OPEN LETTER TO WYNMOOR RESIDENTS

After the senseless murder of 17 individuals in Parkland, our community is faced with a question: What, if anything, can we do?

Consider that in the past two years in Florida, 48 people were murdered at a night club in Orlando; five people were killed at the Ft. Lauderdale airport and now, 17 people murdered at school. This is not to mention all the other mass murders that have taken place since 1999 at Columbine High School.

So, we need to ask one question: Is there anything we can do about it? Is there anything we can do to reduce these types of crimes?

Whether you are a Democrat, Republican or Independent, I hope everyone agrees that the number one priority of any elected official is to safeguard the health and safety of the community. I believe that should be the primary concern of any elected official.

When you watch T.V. you hear the people on "the left" (The liberals) claiming that it is the guns that are killing people. You hear that our gun laws are too lenient. Then you hear people on "the right" (the conservatives) who claim it is not the guns, but the people who commit these crimes. You hear that the real problem is that we need to treat people with mental illnesses.

Regardless of which argument you agree with, the fact is that there are more mass murders than ever before. In the past 6 years, 5 of the 6 deadliest mass murders were done using an assault weapon.

As a County Commissioner, we are not allowed to vote on laws affecting guns or ammunition. It is your State Representatives; State Senators and U.S. Congressmen or U.S. Senators who are responsible for these laws.

However, I would like to hear from you about what you think needs to be done? 

A week ago, Thursday, I dropped a bag with 25 hats and 15 scarves. Friday morning, they were distributed to the shelters.

Friday evening, the temperature dropped to minus 16° C (23° F). When I went to my warm bed that evening, I thought of how many heads and chests were warmed up ... due to my oil change.

Saturday morning, I walked to the train station. I wanted to be elegant and wore my leather gloves. By the time I reached the station, my hands were cold my fingers were frozen. I ran to the dollar store and purchased the thickest mittens you can imagine. On the train, I was sitting and looked at my hands. Here I am knitting for the whole immediate world, but not one pair of gloves for myself.

As they say, "the shoemaker walks with a hole in his shoe," and that was me.

Still, my mother argued, knowing that as the Jewish part of Chernigov in Russia was at least a thousand versts from Prague, how could she be so positive? "Did you really see the Golem in Russia? Did you even read about it? Father said it was only a legend. In fact, father related that it was only a story told by Rabbi Elijah of Chelm."

My mother amplified by stating, "the Golem is a "cholem." (It's just a dream.) And to emphasize, she continued, "we reside in Montreal, in the New World, so why the need to believe in grandmother tales (*bobbe meises*), and even think of the Golem?"

She continued to insist: "The Golem is a cholem!"

Some days later, it was the Feast of Corpus Christi. On that Thursday, Catholics were carrying the consecrated Host with great pomp in a procession along the Main Street of Montreal. The Jewish immigrant community, save for a few peddlers and shoppers, remained home confined behind shutters, remembering anti-Semitic outbreaks, which occurred in Europe on that special day. Out of fear, Jews who were caught outdoors copied their Catholic neighbors by prostrating themselves in allegiance.

My mother, hurrying home from school during lunch hour, was confronted by the parade. Unaware of the custom of her parents in the Old County, she did not prostrate or genuflect as others did. Several young believers saw and noted this failure to respect the rite. They broke away from the cortege and followed my mother heading home on deBullion Street. My mother sensing them behind her, looked over her shoulder. They didn't say a word, but merely took note of her address.

In the evening, my mother mentioned the incident to her parents. Recalling their lives in the pale of Russia, they were alarmed. That night, they lay awake fearing that a drunken peasant might break into their home. When my mother went to her bed, her parents remained awake discussing the situation. Having exhausted any thoughts on the subject, Grandfather went to sleep: Grandmother remained awake. She remembered the Golem, and how it frustrated the evil intentions of two Prague anti-Semites, who sought to show fellow Christians that the Jews were guilty of ritual murder. By the morning, she had reached a conclusion. She would fashion her own Golem and make it come alive. She would shape it into a figure resembling a human being, and uttering God's holy name, bring it to life, since God was the ultimate Creator of life.

By nine the following day, she was already on the Main Street. She went to Becker, the cushion and comforter (*pereneh*) store, and purchased two very large down-filled cushions, and two white cotton sheets. At Tucker's chicken store, she was given, free of charge, two rooster heads and two sets of chicken feet. A non-Kosher (*treife*) butcher presented her with a goat beard and a set of horns. She was now equipped to complete her task.

When she arrived home, she found a needle and sturdy thread, and

proceeded to sew the two sheets together. Then, she fitted and tacked in the cushions, leaving vents to both top and bottom. She attached a pair of chicken feet to each side of the bottom. The rooster heads presented a problem. They would not stay firmly straight. Therefore, she glued them on with a flour paste. Using the same paste, she applied the goat beard under the chicken heads. She then applied grey plasticine to the whole to provide a dry clay effect. The horns that she painted red with blood from the chicken heads were the *piece de resistance*. When she completed her creation, she hid her Golem under her bed. Her Golem would be equal if not superior to the Golem of Rabbi Loew of Prague.

That evening, when stars were already lighting the firmament, she removed the Golem from her hiding place. The family was in the kitchen when she placed the "robot," her Golem, on the windowsill and tied it to the shutters. A memorial (*yahrzeit*) candle was safely placed to illuminate the scene. In a few moments, she was back with her family. Through an open window, she started moaning mysterious incantations.

My mother was the first to hear the frenzied shouts of youths from a distance. "Down with the Jews!" (A bas les juifs!) The shouts were coming closer and closer. My grandparents were petrified. Suddenly, there were cries of fear from the sidewalk.

"The devil is here; let's scram!" (Le diable est ici; Va-t'en!)

My grandfather opened the door and exited on the walk to confirm that the rascals had vanished. As he was returning, he saw the alien contraption behind the window. Unaware of her handiwork, he called for his wife to witness the strange sight. Grandmother joined her husband and daughter. Standing with them, she turned, smiled, and triumphantly announced, "The Golem of deBullion Street has just saved the Coppel family from harm!"

And my pen wrote what lips spoke.


My day is like a staircase,

St-Jean-Longueuil Diocese. As well as Quebec Health Minister Gaetan Barrette, and Alexandra Mendes, MP for the riding of Brossard-St. Lambert. As has become the custom at this annual festive dinner, Israeli Consul General Ziv Nevo Kulman was the honorary president of the event.

### **Coal Fires**

The great London Smog of December 1952 lasted for a full five days. It was then reported to have killed about 5,000 people; recent research however puts the number of deaths at closer to 12,000. It was the inevitable result of hundreds of thousands of coal-fed fires belching smoke up into the atmosphere. A weather system, which confined the smoke down over the city, did not help. Visibility was reduced to about a meter; people were unable to see their feet.

The British coal industry was huge. Vast coal deposits were concentrated in Mid-Scotland, North England, the Midlands and not to forget, South Wales, with its singing miners. In 1952, there was about 800,000 miners digging the stuff out of the ground. The industry was nationalised under the National Coal Board. Miners were ruled by powerful unions; strikes were common.

For the majority of the population, the predominant heating system was coal fires; the coal being distributed mainly by rail or ship. Since just about every seaside town or village in Britain had a solid concrete harbour, a flotilla of small ships was kept busy delivering coal in bulk. Entrepreneurs ordered and received the coal that was then taken to warehouses to be bagged and ready for sale in hundred-weight bags (a hundred-weight equals 112 lbs).

Domestic coal orders, normally placed by housewives, were delivered on flat bed lorries, manned by a driver and an assistant known as a "coal heaver." Deliveries were deposited into wooden coal boxes, usually located at the back of a house. It was no mean feat to carry a hundredweight bag of coal from a lorry to the box. It was an even greater feat to deliver coal to tenement housing in the big cities. These dwellings must have presented a challenge to the average coal heaver, most being 3 to 5 stories high, some even higher. There were no elevators.

I was brought up in a two-story house built with 5 fireplaces and a kitchen stove. Most times, only the living-room fire and the stove were lit. At bedtime, fires were allowed to die and set with kindling and ready for igniting in the morning. I don't remember ever being warm, especially in the Wintertime. Coal fires are without a doubt the least efficient method of heating homes because much of the heat escapes up through the chimney. On a cold evening, sitting in front of a fire, my front was warmed by heat radiating out from the blaze; my back was in Siberia. Too much time spent in front of fires, tended to mottle the skin of the legs. Ladies didn't like having mottled legs.

There are a number of different ranks of coal, the highest being anthracite,

## Florida Trust Also Works **Out of State Property**

Many of my Snowbird clients own a home in Florida and another state. Some of them have their homestead in Florida, others declare their legal residence in another

In either case, a Florida Revocable Living Trust is very useful to avoid probate in both states. If you are a Florida resident, you can own your homestead property via a Revocable Living Trust, without losing your homestead exemption. In addition, you are eliminating the need for probate when you pass away.

You can also transfer real estate owned in any other state to your Florida Trust. Generally, a Florida lawyer will prepare the Revocable Living Trust and Quit Claim Deed to transfer the Florida property into the Trust. If

you are a Florida resident, the lawyer will also prepare a new Florida Last Will and Testament called a "Pourover Will." This provides for the transfer to your Trust upon your death of any other assets not in the Trust or which do not have beneficiaries already designated. It is a security blanket to cover any assets payable to your Estate. For example, if you were to be killed in a car accident due to the negligence of another driver, your Personal Representative would be able to settle your Estate's claim and "pour over" the proceeds into your Trust.

If you are not a Florida resident, you can still create a Florida Revocable Living Trust and execute a Quit Claim Deed to put your Florida property into the Trust. Your Last Will and Testament will be done by a lawyer in the state in which you have your legal residence. In addition, that lawyer can prepare a Deed to transfer the out of state property into the Florida Trust.

For Canadian citizens, there are possible tax aspects to be considered before you create a Florida Trust. These should be discussed with your



Canadian accountant or tax attorney. In general, you will have to weigh the tax consequences versus the money and time that your heirs would save by avoiding probate in Florida.

Another favorable factor in creating a Revocable Living Trust is that you can always amend the Trust without having to change the Deed. In addition, once you create the Trust, you can always buy new properties in any state in the name of the Trust.

The Revocable Living Trust is recommended by most lawyers over a Deed which includes names of other persons, either as joint tenants, tenants in common or a Life Estate Deed. Once another person's name is on a Deed, there are potential risks to you and your property.

These include the possibility that the other person may undergo a divorce, bankruptcy, have a judgment against that person, or die before you or with you in a common accident. It may also affect your homestead exemption. All these risks should be discussed with your attorney before deciding to put someone else's name on your Deed. By contrast, the Revocable Living Trust eliminates those risks, since no other name is on the Deed. You simply transfer it from yourself to yourself as Trustee of your Trust.

a hard, glossy, black deposit. Anthracite was the favoured grade for home heating; it burned finely with a bright, almost smokeless blaze. Coal orders, issued by my mother to one of two suppliers in my village, always stipulated anthracite. However, more often than not, coal of a lesser rank was delivered. Sometimes the delivery contained stones. Although normally a calm, quiet person, this would infuriate my mother. Hell hath no fury like a woman who has received a stony coal consignment.

Once a year, chimneys had to swept to remove soot deposits caked onto the inside brickwork. If neglected, creosote, a flammable deposit, would collect in the flue and chimney fires would occur. The sweep was busy in my village, available by appointment only. His equipment included a circular brush, a number of extension rods and a heavy canvas shroud. Fitted on the end of the first rod, the brush was forced up the chimney as extension rods were added. The shroud, hung from the mantle piece, kept the soot within the grate; it had a central hole with a flap to allow the sweep to add extension pieces.

My job was to stand outside to warn the sweep when his brush had exited the chimney. Counting was not his strongest subject and I was not a reliable lookout. The devil in me liked seeing the brush wiggling around about 10 to 15 feet above the chimney. It was like a distress signal.

In the old days, according to my granny, it was customary for householders to do their own sweeping. Equipment used was a clump of heather, a rope and a 25 lb weight (there was no shortage of heather in Scotland.) The sweeping was, of course, performed from a standing position on the roof; thus, adding an element of danger to the operation.

The great London Smog was an extreme consequence of burning fossil fuels, especially coal. Daily, tons of carbon dioxide, smoke particles and other chemicals were being discharged into the atmosphere. Strong wind conditions were required to blow away a smog, otherwise the pollutants would just hang around. Even without smoggy conditions, I remember the air in the major British seaports to be thick and dirty; outer clothes were permeated with smoke particles. Shirt collars did not last a full day, so we used throw-away paper collars or washable plastic ones.

Gradually, in the developed world, local smoggy situations were reduced by restricting the use of coal for home heating. In Britain, smokeless zones were introduced, and domestic heating switched to oil, gas and electricity. Coal, however, by far, was the cheapest fossil fuel and was still extensively used to generate electricity in power plants.

Sixty-five years have passed since the Great London Smog warning. Did we learn anything?

Sadly, we have not. The world is even more dependant upon coal fired power plants and is likely to remain for decades to come. Demand for power is enormous in what were underdeveloped countries. China, for example, the world's largest producer and consumer of coal, starts two new coal fired power projects every week. Smogs are common in Beijing and other countries, although in cities, domestic burning of coal is prohibited.

Smog, a local phenomenon, is a symptom of a much larger problem - that of global warming. It has been established that the average temperature of the Earth's surface is slowly rising. A majority of scientists have stated that there is a 95% probability that the increase is a result of human activities; in particular the discharge of CO2 into the atmosphere from coal fires.

The weather is changing.

Lately, in California, we have had gigantic wildfires, followed by mud slides; four powerful hurricanes have come thundering out of the Caribbean; the Artic has become navigable and the Greenland glaciers are melting. Etc, etc. Maybe we should pay attention.

### **Passing The Torch**

Do you know the secret of happiness? I do! My father, Harold Oberfeld, revealed the answer many years ago. He had retired from an active life as a physician and was living half of each year in Florida - which he loved. After many brief vacations, he and my mother finally set up housekeeping in two locales - renting two condominiums - each for 12 months - one in Florida and the other in Wisconsin. They did this for many years and loved the freedom of not owning either.

"Happiness," he said, "is getting up in the morn-

ing, taking a course in a subject that really interests you, coming home for lunch, then a nap, and finally going out for a really good dinner." He was right: that is happiness!

He practiced what he preached. So many medical conferences head for Florida, that it was easy for him to find one to attend and enjoy. His thirst for knowledge had always been strong. Every Wednesday, he had boarded a commuter train from Milwaukee to Chicago to attend a class at Cook County Hospital, where he said that he saw more diversity of illnesses than he could cover in a lifetime of practice. As long as he was able, he studied, learned, took courses, attended lectures, and read medical journals.

Dad was a most enthusiastic learner and his passions included, but were not limited to, medicine (first and foremost), the stock market, automobiles, and baseball. He enjoyed - and shared - them all.

I can recall a day when I was about 12, helping out in his office, when he suddenly shouted, "Bev, come here. Feel this man's stomach. See how hard it is. He has peritonitis!" I have no idea how the man reacted to my presence, or how the woman with the infected foot felt as I sprayed anesthetic on her swelling while he lanced it.

I adored working for him -- doing urinalysis tests with a test tube held over a Bunsen burner (which occasionally overheated and spewed a fountain of yellow across the room). What a thrill I felt that he trusted me with the responsibility of developing x-rays and electrocardiograms in the darkroom. This was behind closed doors. The patients never knew.

When I was about 18, I remember being taken to see an autopsy. I was horrified - glad I had not personally known the man who died, and then, awestruck at the beauty of the human body and the wonders of its workings. In exchange, later the same week, when literary critic Frank Baxter presented a Shakespeare lesson on TV, Daddy in turn, shared that moment with me.

Dad was the first doctor in Wisconsin to receive and inject the Polio vaccine and was written up in the local paper, complete with an innocent photo of a child's backside (which would never be published today).

He loved diagnostics and would come home and tell us of the thrill of making the right diagnosis and saving a life. He was our knight and regaled us with tales of the dragons he slew.

I can recall my father learning how to read the EKG tracings late at night and I can also picture him studying 3 by 5 notecards in preparation for delivering a speech. When first invited to lecture, he had experienced such initial stage fright that he enrolled in a Dale Carnegie public speaking class, which changed his life and ours. I recall attending a "heckler's night" to see how neophyte presenters learned to retain their "cool." Mother also later took the course and during World War II, the three of us traveled to playgrounds and local theaters and delivered pep talks, selling war bonds and stamps - yes, me, too, with my very own speech.

I remember sitting next to Dad in a broker's office, watching mysterious illuminated numbers of stock market prices roll by. He explained so much to me - often using the cardboards that accompanied shirts from the cleaners. Sometimes, he drew stock graphs on them; other times he recreated the lines on a football field to explain downs.

Going anywhere with him was an adventure - from racing toward water fountains in parks (which he always won), to attending Brewers games when Milwaukee was still in the minor leagues. Whenever I attend a game, now, I can still hear his words ringing in my ears, predicting what will happen next. The only flaw was that he always wanted to leave at the top of the 9th inning, and I swore that when I grew up, I would stay to the very end of the game - and I do!

I was so very proud the day he won a bet against a man sitting near us in the bleachers. The man (who I now think must have imbibed a lot of Milwaukee beer) announced that more innings had scores than zeroes. Dad disagreed and won! I thought he was brilliant.

So did my children. My psychiatrist daughter said that she became a doctor because Grandpa knew all the answers and she wanted to know all the answers when she grew up. His pronouncements (and value system) left a lasting impression, as on the day when they were strolling together and saw a very fat man emerging with difficulty from a small Volkswagen. "See," he told Marla, "if he had had an education, he would have a larger car." Learning, to my father, was never a choice; it was an end in itself, as well as a road to success. His belief in life-long growth and education was a splendid legacy passed down to his grandchildren, my daughters, Tracy and Marla, and through them to their offspring: his great grandchildren. Both of my parents were the first to college graduates in their families and hoped to encourage

their younger siblings. It didn't happen.

Now, 83 years later, I feel I am reliving my parent's lives. They were both from Montreal and enjoyed the opportunity to get together with their siblings in Florida. Following their example as a Florida renter, I enjoy being with the children of these siblings - my Canadian cousins.

I think of Dad as I head towards my own learning - the computer club, the

art classes, the course in Jewish history, this writers workshop, and - most of all the learning I do by teaching at Wynmoor.

Not a day passes that I don't think of my parents - my mother who failed to enjoy all that Florida offers (that is another story), and my dad who enjoyed it as wholeheartedly as he did everything else.

He was and still is my most cherished role model!



# I Should Never Have Gone To My Bar Mitzvah By Peter Hardis Part II

On Saturday November 19, 1955, I woke up very early in the morning because this was the day of my bar mitzvah. This was also the day I was going to be transformed from being a boy into a man. Given that I was only 4 feet 6 inches tall and weighing only about 68 pounds it would have taken a biblical miracle of epic proportions for anyone to think of me as a man.

Cantor Flussberg, my bar mitzvah teacher and the cantor at the Hebrew Institute and Synagogue, met us at the door and announced to the congregation, "this is Peter Hardis and he is going to be our bar mitzvah boy this morning." Immediately this very old orthodox man stood up and yelled out, "PETER HARDIS is NOT a Jewish name! He can't be a Jew unless he is a convert! This synagogue DOES NOT ALLOW bar mitzvahs for CONVERTS!" Then, from way up in the balcony where the women worshippers sit, my grandmother jumped out of her seat and screamed down to him, "who do you think you are you crazy old man? My grandson is more of a Jew than you'll ever be! You better sit down and shut up before I come down there and straighten you out!" While this exchange was taking place I thought I was going to throw up, collapse, and die.

At this point the rabbi took me by my hand and led me over to a gigantic

chair next to the torah ark. He told me to sit down in it. The problem was that I was so tiny and felt so weak from the tumult my grandma caused that I couldn't lift myself up enough to get into the chair. Cantor Flussberg then came over. He picked me up and put me into the chair just as if he was putting a baby into a high-chair. Once in the chair I heard my grandmother say to my mother, "where is he? I can't see him! What's going on down there? Is he still here?" All the while I was saying to myself, "how do I get out of this place? This woman is destroying me!"

My father was given the honor of opening the ark curtain revealing the biggest torah I had ever seen in my life. The rabbi then lifted me out of the chair and told me to go over to the ark and take the torah out so that the next honoree, Uncle Morris, could remove the covering the torah was wrapped in. I grabbed the handles of the torah and removed it from the ark. When uncle Morris came up I whispered to him, "I don't think I can hold onto the torah much longer, it's too heavy for me." Uncle Morris said, "you are doing just fine. Don't worry! We are all so proud of you!" Then the rabbi, who was standing right next to me told me to raise the torah high above my head and bring it over to the rabbi's lectern. I started to lift it high above my head but then I lost control of it. As the torah fell from my hands it hit the rabbi on his head with a tremendous thud, then it bounced off his shoulder causing the rabbi to fall to the floor with the torah following him. When it hit the ground it began to completely unravel with the torah scroll stretching from one end of the bemah to the other. At that moment there was a loud outburst of crying and wailing by the horrified congregants. Many rushed up to the bemah to try to save the torah. They were kissing it and saying prayers over it as they tried to roll the scroll back into it so that it could at least resemble a torah once again. As soon as the rabbi was able to get himself up off the floor he said to me, "I will not allow you to continue. YOU MUST LEAVE NOW!" Then he called out to my parent's, "you must take your son and get him out of the synagogue immediately!!"

When the rabbi said, "YOU MUST LEAVE NOW!", I wanted to kiss him. When I looked around I noticed that he seemed very unsteady on his legs and suddenly he fell to the floor once again. "Get that kid out of here, get him out!" At that point I left the synagogue and that finally brought to a close just about the worst year I ever had. Oh, and before I forget, because my grandmother was so impressed with my bar mitzvah performance, she never spoke to me again. THE END



# Deat Dr. Joy.

So, no questions in my mailbox this month. You will have to bear with me as I ramble about a subject that just keeps coming up in my discussions with people: selfishness. This will be in part a small excerpt from a chapter in my book.

Being unselfish has been pounded into us forever. We have been told since we were tiny tots that selfishness was bad, and we should avoid being that way. When we were children, it was often about sharing our precious possessions with another child. I remember when my first granddaughter was very young, and I was babysitting. If she had a friend coming over I would advise her that anything she didn't want to share, she didn't have to, but she would have to put it away somewhere and that anything left over was to be shared. It worked quite well. At least she never moved her entire toy room into her bedroom.

Of course, anyone telling you that you are being selfish usually means that you aren't doing what they want or giving them what they need. I have always found this rather amusing because it made me wonder just who was being selfish here. However, calling someone selfish is almost like cursing at them. This is so far from the way it really is and so many people are reluctant to understand and accept the true nature of what selfishness is. It is not about exploiting or taking advantage of anyone else. It is about taking care of ourselves. It is about understanding how much we matter. When you are questioning this or trying hard to be "unselfish," you are in a state of inner conflict.

This is you trying to change yourself into something you were not meant to be. Once again, importantly, this does not mean or even insinuate, not caring about others or wanting them to give you whatever you want. That is not the definition of selfishness. It is the definition of narcissism.

I tell people I am selfish all the time. They really have no idea what I am talking about, especially because I don't appear mean or narcissistic. Because I am neither. But I am selfish. I can't help anyone if I don't take care of myself first. And I understand that means looking for ways for me to feel happier, more at peace and emotionally stronger. For me, it also means that I don't keep

a balance sheet. If I need a favor from someone who can't do it, I recognize that they can't do it. I don't expect people to put my needs before their own. It doesn't matter how you want to take care of yourself or what is important to you. The idea is to maintain your good feelings and your equilibrium, regardless of what is happening around you.

I like and prefer to be with similarly healthily selfish people. I remember my mentor, Nathaniel Branden, saying that, no one wants the fruit of someone else's sacrifice. I loved hearing that. I want to know that the person who wants to be with me or even do something for me is doing it because it is giving them pleasure. I don't want to use them to serve myself at their expense, nor do I want to be used so they can serve themselves. This does not preclude or negate my doing something for someone else because I want to, and it is a value to me to do so.

I hope this doesn't confuse anyone, but you will most likely be able to tell why you want to be with someone and why someone wants to be with you, why you want to do something for someone and why they might be doing something for you. Your beliefs will be screaming at you to not be selfish and sacrifice your good feelings for the sake of those of another while your feelings are telling quite a different story.

Perhaps the first question to ask yourself is: if you believe that you are supposed to be living your precious life for the well-being of someone else, not sometimes because you really want to, but at those times when you know you really don't want to but think you should. If your answer is yes, then go on to the companion question. Do you believe that someone else is supposed to live his or her precious life towards your well-being? Did you answer yes to that also, or did this question have you answering no? If you answered "yes" to the first and "no" to the second, ask yourself a third question. Why is their life so much more important than yours?







# A Quality Display Of **Awesome Attire** Made of Paper By Barry Isaac

In early February, I returned to the Society of the 4 Arts in Palm Beach, Florida and I appreciated its current exhibit, "Isabelle de Borchgrave: Fashioning Art From Paper." This exhibit continues until April 15, 2018. Isabelle de Borchgrave, a Contemporary Artist crafted a world of splendor from simple paper. She formed "Fool the Eye" masterpieces of elaborate dresses and other attire including shoes, purses, and kaftans made of paper. The elaborate dresses and attire were based on paintings produced in the Renaissance Period by Sandro Botticelli "Flora," Benozzo Gozzoli, and "Lorenzo D'Magnifico." The elaborate dresses and attire that were made of paper were also based on Baroque Period paintings by Justus Sustermans. "Maria Magdalena D'Austria," painting came from the Flint Art Michigan in Michigan, Peter Paul Rubens, "Charlotte Marguerite De Montmorency, Princess of Conde," a very detailed work that emphasizes textures, painting is currently on display in this art museum, Alessandro Allori, "Isabelle de Medicis," and Francois Boucher, among others.

I also liked Borchgrave's paper creations made of paper based on 20th Century paintings by Pablo Picasso, "Woman in Blue," Giorgio de Chirico, "Male Guest," very Surreal, and Henri Matisse, "Mandarin."

This Belgian artist also produced paper kaftans based on clothing worn by prominent Persians in the 20th Century such as; "Kaftan Safir-Sadr, Sapphire," very resplendent colors and "Kaftan Djavan-Sadr Youth."

I also relished the fine curatorial work of the Society of 4 Arts staff in producing this superb exhibit. Admission is five dollars. Parking is free and plentiful. So, take advantage of this fine exhibit before it leaves Palm Beach.

# HISTORY CORNER

#### Angelina Grimke Weld: But She Was Right



Angelina wrote a letter asking Theodore Weld, a man she was interested in, why he did not like her. He replied, "you are full of pride and anger." Several years later and two days after they were married in 1838, she spoke in Pennsylvania Hall in Philadelphia. An angry mob threw rocks through the windows and then burnt the building down. I guess Philadelphia is not the city of "Sisterly Love." As a young girl, she agitated her family and neighbors so much that they sent her North to live with relatives. She was a member

and teacher in the Presbyterian Church until she was expelled in 1829 for her outspokenness. In like manner, the Quaker community kicked her out of their church because she married a non-Quaker and then they burned her writings. The leaders in the state of South Carolina, her home state, said she would be jailed if she ever returned. I don't know if you could live with her, but she certainly would be one interesting person to have a drink with.

So, who was Angelina Grimke Weld? She was the youngest of fourteen children, white, privileged, Christian, and the daughter of a wealthy slave-owning plantation owner in South Carolina. Her family described her as curious, self-righteous, condescending, and outspoken. Her father believed only males should be educated, so she learned from her brothers' lessons. Not satisfied with her own learning, she began to teach slaves how to read, write and do math. This was against Southern law and her father punished her repeatedly for her actions. After being sent North to live with relatives, she and her sister, Sara, were the only two Southern women in the Abolition Movement. They traveled to over sixty cities, speaking from first-hand experience about the horrible conditions of slaves in the South.

Her most famous article was, "An Appeal to Christian Women of the South." The pamphlet was powerful because it was so simple. Her arguments were based on common sense, the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Bible. In writing to Christian women of the South, one might say

she was preaching to the choir, but the choir was resistant and defiant. She begins the piece by reassuring her Christian sisters of her love for them and the friendship they had together. She writes, "I ask you now for the sake of former confidence, and former friendship, to read the following pages in the spirit of calm investigation and fervent prayer. It is because you have known me that I write thus to you..."

The following is a summary of her argument:

- 1. You say your slaves are happier than their masters because they don't have the responsibility of ownership and they are treated so well. Which of you would trade places with your slave?
- 2. As mothers, are you willing to have your children enslaved?
- 3. The Bible instructs, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Can you really love a person and continue to do to them what you don't want done to yourself?
- 4. Slavery is contrary to the Declaration of Independence. "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness."
- 5. Slavery reduces man to a thing. This is against the laws of God.
- 6. God created all people equal and loves everyone.
- 7. Christian faith calls for love, charity, and good will to be given to all.
- 8. The Constitution and the Bible bestow human rights for all.

She countered the claims that women had no political power and could do nothing. "Rubbish," she claimed, "you women have fathers, brothers, husbands, and sons. This is your voice. Use it for God, country, and decency." Her point, for which she was hated and ostracized, was that slavery and those who practice, support it, or do nothing to challenge it are in defiance of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution of the United States, and the Christian faith. Democracy, fairness, and love are for all, not a select few.

Angelina Grimke Weld may not have had a lot of friends, but she went to her grave speaking the truth. She was right. Comments can be made at chooserightly.com under "article of the month."

#### Can You Afford To Retire Early?

Plus, if you're still working, you may be able to afford delaying your Social Security payments until you're closer to your "normal" retirement age, which, as defined by the Social Security Administration, likely will be 66 or 67. The longer you put off taking these benefits, the bigger your monthly checks, although they will max out once you reach 70.

And even if you are not able to retire early, some of the moves you took to reach that goal, such as contributing as much as you could afford to your IRA and 401(k), controlling your debts, and so on, may pay off for you during your retirement, whenever it begins. See ou ad on page 31.





Many of us know someone who was killed or know a person who had a friend, family member or neighbor closely connected to one or more victims. The mourning also can have personal meaning as it may bring back things that weren't said to a loved one in one's own life. It is a reminder of the preciousness of life. Life can be taken away at any time and we might not have taken the chance to thank or hug someone or repair a damaged relationship. In watching the moving videos of family members of the victims, the voices of the survivors and those intimately connected to the horrible murder of the seventeen innocent people. There was a very touching text exchange between two brothers during the shooting that was reported on MSNBC. One of the Zeif brothers commented above their texts; "scariest part of it all was knowing my little brother was right above me and not knowing if I would ever see him again. I've never really treated him the way he deserved. Not anymore. Seeing his face outside of school was the most relief I have ever felt. My prayers to all."

Can we learn to appreciate each other in the way that the Zeif boys do? A friend of mine told me what she keeps thinking about are the acts of bravery of teachers, coaches and students that let people in the classrooms or shielded fellow students from the bullets at the cost of their own lives.

Kelsey Friend said to the family of her teacher Scott Beigel, "please know that your son or your brother was an amazing person and I'm alive today because of him. Thank you for bringing and having this amazing person in life and giving him the power to be stronger than I could have ever been." This sentiment was also expressed by those protected by Aaron Feis and Peter Wang. There were so many heroes that day.

What can you carry into daily life that will help to change the world? Are there grudges or old conflicts with people that seem unimportant now? Is there someone you want to reach out to and are you more conscious about how things can change in the blink of an eye? What else would you like to do in life to realize your dreams and potential? We are blessed with still having some time ahead of us and the ability to make our marks on the world through our words, smiles and actions.

# WYNMOOR Golf and Tips

The term "play it forward" is an initiative by the United States Golf Association. The program encourages golfers to assess their driving distance and then select the appropriate yardage or tee to play at their club. The idea, in addition to having more fun, provides the best chance for one to hit more greens in regulation. Regulation is a term for the allotted strokes on a par 3, 4, and par 5. One shot is considered regulation for a par 3 and always two putts makes for a par. Accord-

ingly, two shots is considered regulation on a par 4 with two putts making a par 4. Par 5's allows for three shots and two putts.

If you are not hitting many greens in regulation, by all means, move to a tee yardage that affords you the best chance of hitting the green and making pars. There are several advantages to this initiative. Your scores should improve, your round should take less time and you will have more fun.

I am reminded when Bob Toski played the Wynmoor course and how he played the white tees. From these tees, he was able to select a middle to short iron on the par 3 holes and the par 4 holes a driver and short iron to reach the green in regulation. Personally, I believe the tees should not be gender specific, but rather by skill level and driving distance.

Wynmoor golf course has four gold tees, which make holes 3, 16, and 18 more friendly as they are in front of the hazard. If you are realistic with your abilities and choose the appropriate teeing area, you will surely enjoy this great game.

# Why The Environment Matters For Your Health And The Health Of Future Generations

#### Television's Dr. Oz and Cleveland Clinic's, Dr. Roizen, report on health, wellness and quality of life.

Midway through the fifth game of the World Series, it seemed like everyone in the Houston Astrodome, players, coaches and fans (more than 69,000 people), held up signs for cancer awareness. On each one was written the name of someone who had or has cancer; many signs read "Mom."

These days, cancer survival rates are heading up; the death rate from cancer is down 25 percent from 1991 to 2014. More than 2.1 million folks have made it who wouldn't have before.

Diagnosis of cancer also has declined in some areas. Most of the drop is related to prostate cancer; overdiagnosis has declined rapidly. New lung cancer cases also are declining as fewer and fewer folks smoke. And recent reductions in diagnosis of colorectal cancers seem related to the increasing frequency of colonoscopies. Among folks over 50,

colonoscopies have increased from 21 to 60 percent in the past 15 years. However, for those under age 50, the rates of colorectal cancer are alimbing. And that's a congruin the minesheft. Exposure to toying in food

climbing. And that's a canary in the mineshaft. Exposure to toxins in food, air and water, lifestyle choices (too little sleep, irregular eating habits), obesity and more are fueling a growing cancer risk.

That's also reflected in the most vulnerable part of our population: children. While survival rates are way up, there's been a 0.6 percent increase in the incidence of childhood cancers every year from 1975 through 2013, which adds up to a 22 percent jump. On top of that, over 220,000 new cases of rare cancers, not including the 8,850 estimated new cases of testicular cancer, are expected in 2017.

What's going on? The cumulative effect of an endless stream of under or unregulated chemicals in our air, food, water, and household products may be taking a toll, even as we become ever more adept at treating cancers. Pollution now causes 16 percent of all deaths globally, 15 times more than all wars and other forms of violence.

#### What We Don't Need

Last year, your Environmental Protection Agency declared that the pesticide chlorpyrifos posed an unacceptable risk to humans, especially children. Then four months later, the new head of the EPA, Scott Pruitt, struck down a planned ban on the pesticide, despite massive data developed



by his own agency showing that when its residue is found in fruits, vegetables and drinking water, young people can incur diminished cognitive abilities and reduced IQ. Chlorpyrifos is the most-used insecticide in the U.S., with 4 to 8 million pounds applied annually, often on tree nuts, soybeans, corn, wheat, apples, and citrus.

Other examples: A new study in Neuro Toxicology found that prenatal exposure to the hormone disrupter bisphenol A, or BPA, even at levels below those currently considered safe for humans, affects gene expression related to sexual differentiation and neurodevelopment in lab tests. Eek! Ditch those heat-transfer receipts, plastic bottles, and packaging. A study presented at the Society for Endocrinology annual conference found perchlorate (used in solid propellants, munitions, fireworks, airbag

initiators, matches and signal flares, in some electroplating operations and some disinfectants and herbicides) is showing up in water and food, and leads to problems with human fetal brain development!

#### **Economic Cents and Sense**

The excuse for removing regulations that claims they are an economic disaster is just plain wrong. According to the just-released, The Lancet Commission on Pollution and Health, pollution control is economically smart: "In regions where air pollution control has been implemented, large-scale benefits have accrued. For example, in the United States, a \$30 benefit is estimated to have resulted from each \$1 invested in controlling air pollution. This benefit has been seen in health, productivity and life expectancy."

That's why it's important to insist that your representatives act on that knowledge and protect each of YOU, your children, and their children's children from pollution's insidious effects. We have the knowledge and technology to clean up the environment. Now we just need the will.


