Why The March 12th City Election Will Affect Wynmoor Residents

On March 12th, the City of Coconut Creek will be holding an election for one of its City Commission seats. Becky Tooley, who is running for re-election, is the only candidate who has announced her opposition to the Turnpike expansion.

Two years ago, the State of Florida announced that it would be expanding the Turnpike for 3 miles. Such expansion would put the Turnpike barrier wall five feet from Wynmoor's property line as well as close to other home communities in Coconut Creek. After the announcement, County Commissioner, Mark Bogen and many of Coconut Creek City Commissioners announced their opposition to such expansion claiming it would ruin the quality of life for thousands of Coconut Creek residents. After the opposition to the expansion was expressed, the State of Florida backed down and said it was being put on the back burner.

Now two years later, there is discussion about


the options for the Turnpike expansion. Therefore, Wynmoor and Coconut Creek residents need to have as many elected officials opposing the expansion of the Turnpike as possible. During the past two years, Becky Tooley and her City Commissioners worked with County Commissioner, Bogen to stop the expansion.

"Two years ago, the State of Florida backed off its proposal to expand the Turnpike into the backyards of Wynmoor and Coconut Creek residents. However, we need all residents to support those elected officials who will continue the fight against the expansion. Becky Tooley was very helpful in our fight and she deserves to be reelected to help us continue the fight," said County Commissioner, Mark Bogen.

The election on March 12th is open to all voters from 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM. PLEASE COME OUT AND VOTE!!



I booked the ticket and called Carol, my "machatainista." That's Yiddish for my son or daughter's mother-in-law and I truly believe English desperately needs a similarly succinct term. We exchanged sighs and "oys." She promised to keep in close touch which was crucial because Carol was actually there, in the same city, an eye witness to history. She also promised to pick me up from the train on Saturday. We both expected the baby to arrive by midnight.

Carol called shortly after dinner to say the kids had gone to the hospital. Everything was fine. The dula had arrived. How did we manage without dulas? Carol had been directed not to come to the hospital until the kids said it was OK and of course, she dared not arrive a moment earlier. No sane parent would ever disregard the wishes of their adult children who were on the cusp of becoming parents themselves. The consequences are too frightening to consider. So, we waited.

Jon would call when something happened. But he didn't call. And he didn't call. Carol and I conferred. Yes, first babies are often slow. Everything was probably just fine. We were being overly nervous. Our own experience made matters worse. Caesarians, induced labor, twins, BIG twins. We knew from problems.

The not knowing, as everybody knows, is the worst. At least, when you're the one having the baby, you know what's happening. We were floundering in a black hole of "what ifs." What if the baby is in distress? What if Ellana is in terrible pain or, God forbid, danger? That familiar parental terror I, like so many others, usually conceal fairly well, doubled to encompass two generations.

Two o'clock in the morning, the phone rings. Not a problem. I'm completely awake. It's Carol calling to tell me that she knows NOTHING. NOTHING! My son hasn't called. She's going out of her mind. She wants to go to the hospital, but her husband insists she go back to bed and wait. Is he insane? Why didn't Jon call? Did I raise a man completely lacking in basic human

compassion or did something really terrible happen?

At 6:30 AM, Carol phoned the hospital. They tell her they can't tell her anything. That's all we need to hear. Miraculously, my son, M.I.A. for hours, calls. Everything is alright, just slower than expected. What isn't he telling us? I leave for the train station, cell phone in hand, and uncharacteristically, turned on.

Carol is the best co-grandma. She calls every couple of hours so we can breathe together. Twelve o'clock: "She's starting to push." Two o'clock: "I can't understand what happened. Jon didn't call." Three o'clock: escalating worry. Something is not right. Five hundred pounds of fear settle on my chest. Carol and I decide to go immediately from the train station to the hospital. Never mind the kids' admonition, "Don't come til we tell you."

We find the Birthing Center (prehistorically known as the maternity ward). It's now 5 o'clock and not hearing any news since Noon, we're trembling with worry. The nice man tells us Ellana is in surgery as we speak, having a caesarian. We're actually relieved; at last, a concrete piece of information to clutch. He tells us to get dinner and come back in a couple of hours. OK. Carol's cellphone suddenly rings and frightened of crashing the entire hospital's electrical system, she quickly hides in a comer to answer.

"I'm in room 314," Jon whispered. And there was Ruby in her tiny hospital crib with the plastic sides and her slightly dazed, ecstatic daddy beside her. Mummy was still in recovery. Bending over the crib, I drank in my son's little girl, a beautiful new life, unbelievably perfect, from her silky dark hair escaping a tiny cap, and framing her sleepy face, to her pink swaddled body. Tears fill my eyes when I recall that moment. On that day, a vast and dazzling blend of joy, love, amazement and profound gratitude surged through me with such power, it would surely have shattered the mortal body that holds my spirit if my tears had not poured out like a gift and spread my happiness through the room and beyond.

Everyone knows that Grandma is always right. My first proof of this came when I was seven. I told her, much to her surprise, that I was worried about the outcome of the Illinois Governor's race. I'd seen a negative campaign ad on television that one of the candidates did not like women. Grandma was flabbergasted that someone so young could worry about such a thing and assured me that, no matter who was governor, my life would not change much. Well, she was right.

She's been right about a lot since. Taking diagonal streets *does* save time. Movie theaters *are* always cold, and I *should* bring a sweater. Grandma's advice has led me to where I am today. She taught me to love writing, value knowledge, and choose a career that makes me excited to go to work each day. So here I am, a PhD student on her way to becoming a Professor.

Grandma also knows best when it comes to boys. She was there when I met my first boyfriend at age 16. Grandma and I were having dinner at one of her favorite places, Ruby Tuesday, and he was our waiter. Grandma knew, even before I did, that he liked me and that he was a good catch. Guns **By Phil Edwards**

My introduction to guns was behind the chicken coop on my grandfather's farm when I was seven. My father and grandfather got distracted putting up a target and my 5-year-old younger brother stuck the barrel of a loaded 22 rifle in my stomach and said, "Stick-em up!" My father went ballistic and so began our training in gun safety and marksmanship. In high school, my father built a target range in our basement where my brothers and I continued our safety and marksmanship training. My father always kept a loaded 38 pistol in his night stand. Before judging my father, he was a WWII veteran who was wounded three times with three purple hearts and earned two bronze stars for bravery. He thought he was doing the right thing by teaching us to shoot.

In my junior year of high school, my father bought a Peugeot car with a sliding roof. Sad to say, my friends and I were typical boys. While I drove the car through a local park, two of my friends shot our guns from the windows, while the other two sat on the roof and shoot from there. As far I know, we never hurt anyone, and we were never caught.

After returning from Vietnam, having served in Saigon for 6 months as a military policeman and in Long Bein for seven months in a night ambush company, I did not touch a gun until two years ago when my wife's brotherin-law showed me his collection of muskets and five of his M15 rifles. My nearest neighbors at our cottage hunt every year for deer meat to feed their

For my whole life I have been a gun advocate. But a couple of things have really shaken me.

I taught Nick Cruz for a year at Cross Creek School, in Pompano Beach, Florida. He transferred to Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School where he later slaughtered seventeen high school students in 2018. Equally jarring was the earlier shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School in 2012 that claimed

the lives of 27 kindergarten students. Really?

Cross Creek School is a center for "seriously emotionally disturbed students." In my classroom, I had a sign above the white board. It read, "Control Yourself or Someone Else Will!"

I bring that thought to the gun violence debate. The NRA, gun owners, collectors, hunters, and dealers have not moved this country to any common-sense gun laws, rather they resisted for generations gun reform that would decrease the 40,000 lives lost to gun violence last year in this country.

Perhaps, no, not perhaps, it is time to take the guns away until we as a country can learn how to be responsible with them.

We Still Have Work To Do

2018 was the "Year of the Woman." More women were elected to Congress than ever before. The #MeToo and #TimesUp movements continued to bring issues of sexual harassment and gender bias in to the news, and women (and men) showed up in the streets, online and everywhere to advance women's

Now it's 2019, and we still have work to do. For women.

"The Women's March," a leading organization in the bourgeoning women's movement, is now plagued by accusations of antisemitism and in-fighting. A recent New York Times story, chronicles how an earlier Jewish leader in the Women's March, Vanessa Wruble, was pushed out by other women. To many Jewish feminists, the March's statement against anti-Semitism was too little, too late, with several organizations leaving the coalition and overall turnout down at 2019 marches.

Yet we can't afford to let this tension tamper with the positive energy and momentum around women's rights and empowerment. This energy inspired Continued on page 14

me to redirect my professional life so that I could work for a women's organization and have a bigger impact.

It's been a year since three Jewish women, Shifra Bronznick, Barbara Dobkin and Rabbi Joanna Samuels, wrote about #MeToo and women's basic rights coming to the fore in eJewishPhilanthropy: "What is potentially transformational about this moment is that for once, the problem to be fixed is not women, but rather an overall social system that is anchored in male privilege and male violence." Since then, the Jewish community has come together to try to address systemic forms of inequality in the Jewish community, most notably in the Safety, Equity, and Respect Coalition of which I am a member of the Steering Committee.

As we set off into 2019, gender bias and the gender gap continue to permeate all aspects of society. To change that, all of us must work to recognize the systemic barriers that stand in our way. Each of us must help identify and challenge barriers to women's equality, wherever we see them.

In politics, even as more women assume leadership positions in local, state and national offices, women still make up less than 25% of Congress. This number should be 50%. While several high-profile men have been outed for their sexually harassing behavior, rumors still swirl about several others who have yet to be made public.

Looking at the business world "only 26 women are in CEO roles at Fortune 500 companies," according to a "Pew Research Report." Among the top 100 venture firms, only 8% of partners are female, according to Crunchbase and 90% of venture dollars globally go to all-male teams.

We still have work to do.

At Hadassah, the Women's Zionist Organization of America, women's health equity is a priority issue. Yet in the medical field, there are far too few women in leadership positions where they can advance equity in medical prevention, research, funding, and quality of care. Only 18% of hospital CEOs are women, and only 7% of the editors in chief of medical journals are women, according to a recent report in the "Harvard Business Review."

We still have work to do.

The task can seem daunting. With each step forward, it seems women take several steps back. But we must continue pushing forward. Jewish women have played a unique leadership role in the modern women's movement. Just look at Bella Abzug, Gloria Steinem and more recently Sheryl Sandberg to name a few. Given white Jewish women's historical prominence in the women's movement over the decades, it does not surprise me that we are experiencing a backlash now. Other minority women's groups want to be heard and seen. They should be! However, there are lots of moving parts in this movement. One group's dominance at any one time should not shut out another group. Among them, we must hear the voices of both Jewish and non-Jewish women of color.

We still have work to do.

Women have always gained power by organizing, by finding common ground and working together. The suffragettes were divided over their views on slavery and abolition. Yet, they pushed forward. This history still resonates today. Women are not a monolithic group. We will always have disagreements and, as part of a broader movement, each of us will fight to advance our priority issues. Yet, we must keep the bigger picture in mind. We must highlight all of our lived experiences and share our stories around power, harassment, motherhood, and work. All women must be empowered to speak up.

We still have work to do.

It is at times like these that we see just how much we still need the power of women's organizations to help create unity around women's rights and gender equity, and to fight misogyny.

Hundred-plus-year old women's organizations like Hadassah can still galva-



nize its 300,000 members, who live in every congressional district! We can fight for women's health care, equality and empowerment. New organizations like #TimesUp can push for gender equity in the entertainment business and inspire smaller initiatives like the Gender Equity in Hiring Project, which focuses on the Jewish community.

In the Jewish community, the disparity runs deep. As Gail Cooks, who leads an organization focused on next-generation Jewish leadership, has pointed out, about 70% of the total workforce in the Jewish not-for-profit sector is female; about 30% are men. "But when it comes to leadership positions," she noted, "it's the exact reverse."

We still have work to do.

On a positive note, there's one place where women are disproportionately represented: philanthropy. Studies show that women are more likely to give and to give more. And there's more good news from a recent study by the "Women's Philanthropy Institute:" when people find out that others are donating to support women and girls, they're more likely to support women and girls themselves.

"Who makes the strongest coffee in the world? Several of my students answered, "Brazil, Columbia and Costa Rica." I replied that I did not ask who grew the strongest coffee but who made the strongest coffee. They immediately replied, "the Italians with their expresso," again, I said "no." To give my students a hint in the right direction, I asked them to tell me what the two basic ingredients in a cup of coffee without cream or sugar were. They immediately replied, "coffee and water."

With this information, I asked them, "What benefit does coffee offer a person?" They answered, "that it keeps you awake and provides a degree of energy." I told them, "that was a start in the right direction." Then, I asked

Woodstock Festival: The Birth Of A New Generation Called "Hippy" By Lil Miller

August 15, 1969, "an end of a generation," to quote Richard Nixon, our President in office in 1969. August 1969 Woodstock took place in Max Yasgur's dairy farm in the town of Bethel (outside of White Lake in New York, a 600-acre farm).

The organizers of Woodstock Festival were four young men, the oldest was 27 years old. He was Roberts - an heir to a pharmaceutical fortune and was looking far away to use his money, for an investment: it was created in to a two-day rock concert for 50,000 people, with hopes the concert would raise enough money to pay for a recording studio. All names rock bands played at the Festival. Tickets were \$7 for one day, \$13 for two days. A new location was found instead of Wallkill Town, and so, a 600-acre farm was offered to them by Max Yasgur. With added confusion with parking, concession stands, a playground and restrooms, huge problems were starting to develop!

Attendance jumped to 200,000 people! Because more and more utilities had to be built, it was almost a threat to cancel at the last minute! Rice was air lifted as food supply and a storage of police officers was called in for last minute help, all while thousands began to arrive for this two-day event.

Organizers were forced to admit people for free admission! No one planned for a half million people to arrive! 500,000 people actually made it to Woodstock Festival. Cars were abandoned in the streets!

Woodstock Festival was started. Jim Hendrix was the last to play. Lots of other psychedelic bands played as well. There was lots of drugs, lots of sex, and lots of mud! The organizers had created the most popular music event in history! With a debt over one million and 70 lawsuits, luck was with them. A hit movie was made, leaving them only in \$100,000 in debt.

A "skinny dipping pond" was created for people to bathe in. In 1984, land owners, Louis Nicky and June Gelish, put up land markers called, "peace" and "music." In 1989, 20,000 people gathered at the site for a 20th Anniversary celebration. Now, 80 lawsuits were filed against Woodstock Ventures.

The movie financed debts and paid off 1.4 million in debt that Woodstock had occurred. A "plaque" had been placed for all generations to visit.

Woodstock had become the first "Hippy Music Festival" in History and a birth of a new generation.



Put Together a Professional Team to Help You Reach Your Goals

As you work toward achieving your goals in life, you will need to make moves that contain financial, tax and legal elements, so you may want to get some help – from more than one source.

For starters, you may decide, possibly upon the recommendation of your financial advisor, to sell some investments and use the proceeds to buy others that may now be more appropriate for your needs. If you sell some investments you've held for a year or less and realize a capital gain on the sale, the gain generally will be considered short-term and be taxed at your ordinary income tax rate. But if you've held the investments for more than a year before selling, your gain will likely be considered long-term and taxed at the lower, long-term capital gains rate, which can be 0%, 15% or 20%, or a combination of those rates.

On the other hand, if you sell an investment and realize a capital loss, you may be able to apply the loss to offset gains realized by selling other, more profitable investments and also potentially offset some of your ordinary income. So, as you can see, the questions potentially raised by investment sales – "Should I sell?" "If so, when?" "If I take some losses, how much will they benefit me at tax time?" – may also be of importance to your tax advisor, who will need to account for sales in your overall tax picture. As such, it's a good idea for your tax and financial advisors to communicate about any investment sales you make.

Your tax and financial advisors also may want to be in touch on other is-

sues, such as your contributions to a retirement plan. For example, if you are self-employed or own a small business, and you contribute to a SEP-IRA – which is funded with pre-tax dollars, so the more you contribute, the lower your taxable income – your financial advisor can report to your tax advisor (with your permission) how much you've contributed at given points in a year, and your tax advisor can then let you know how much more you might need to add to move into a lower tax bracket, or at least avoid being bumped up to a higher one. Your financial advisor will be the one to recommend the investments you use to fund your SEP-IRA.

Your financial advisor can also help you choose the investment or insurance vehicles that can fund an estate-planning arrangement, such as an irrevocable living trust. But to establish that trust in the first place, and to make sure it conforms to all applicable laws, you will want to work with an attorney experienced in planning estates. Your tax professional may also need to be brought in. Again, communication between your various advisors is essential.

These are but a few of the instances in which your financial, tax and legal professionals should talk to each other. So, do what you can to open these lines of communication – because you'll be one who ultimately benefits from this teamwork.

WYNMOOR Golf and Tips

Leave The Flagstick In?



The USGA has revamped the "2019 Rules of Golf" to be fairer and speed up the pace of play. The most notable change, in my opinion, is the choice to putt with the flagstick still in the hole without penalty if your ball strikes the pin.

As golf becomes more and more a game of science, putting experts have opined and re-

searched the advantages of leaving the flagstick in the hole or taking it out. It seems from their research one would have a greater chance to make putts while leaving the flagstick in the hole. Adam Scott feels it's a mockery of the way the game was intended to be played. Bryson Dechambeau, AKA the scientist, has certainly embraced the new rule and odds are he has the research to back it up.

Personally, I thought the intent of the rule was to speed play up which it will. However, it is being utilized in a very different way. Strategizing the odds of the ball striking the pin to your advantage doesn't seem like the intent nor spirit of the game. It will be interesting to see what the Master's committee does this year. They will have four months to observe the reaction from the players and possibly the fans for the upcoming Masters at Augusta.

The PGA tour has a few rules such as the "Metal Spike Policy" and the "One Ball Rule" that are for the tour professionals only. Some other new rules such as repairing damage to the green like spike marks and no extra penalty for double hits seem fairer in 2019.

"The Lost Ball Rule" is now only a threeminute search instead of five minutes and should improve the pace of play. There are numerous other subtle changes to the rules and definitions and in totality they make the game a bit friendlier and more logical. Consult the United States Golf Association at USGA.org for a complete summary of the rule's changes.



Co-Trustee For Your Revocable Living Trust

A Revocable Living Trust is an excellent legal means to avoid probate on your home and other property. It allows your heirs to inherit your property quickly, without Court intervention. It also saves your heirs thousands of dollars in attorney's fees and Court costs.

The Revocable Living Trust can be useful, not only when you die, but also if you become incapacitated. People mistakenly assume that a Durable Power of Attorney will cover all assets that are in the Trust. This is not true. Most Revocable Living Trust documents include specific paragraphs regarding disability. Typically, this language requires that two doctors state in writing, that the Trustee is unable to carry on his legal affairs. In these situations, the Successor

Trustee (typically a son or daughter) will need to get written statements from two doctors and then go through legal and administrative red tape before being able to take over an asset of the Trust for the benefit of the disabled Trustee.

Therefore, if you are the sole Trustee of your Trust, you should seriously consider an Amendment to your Trust, adding a trusted family member or close friend as your Co-Trustee rather than your Successor Trustee. This will allow that person to take over any asset which is in the name of your Trust, without the need for written statements from two doctors or Court intervention.

If you and your spouse are Co-Trustees, but your spouse is beginning to have short term memory loss or other signs of dementia, it is wise to replace your spouse as Co-Trustee with another trusted family member or friend. If you have accounts in the name of your Trust with a bank or brokerage,

you will need to provide the Amendment to that institution. Proper documentation will be required (signature card, copy of driver's license, etc.) to allow your new Co-Trustee to access funds in that account. A Durable Power of Attorney is still important


as a supplement to your Trust to cover all finances that are outside of the Trust, such as an IRA, life insurance policies and all other accounts not titled in the Trust. The Durable Power of Attorney also covers legal matters, like signing contracts, leases and other documents on your behalf which may have nothing to do with the Trust. For example, if you become incapacitated and need to go into an assisted living facility, the person you designate under your Durable

Power of Attorney would be able to sign a lease for you.

Therefore, for full protection, it is important to have a Durable Power of Attorney and a Revocable Living Trust with a Co-Trustee. A Designation of Health Care Surrogate and Living Will are also important for someone to make medical decisions if you are unable to communicate your choice.

Springtime is a Good Time to Talk Driving Safety



Springtime is a good time to talk driving safety. Actually, any time is a good time to think about traffic safety, wearing your seatbelt, and eliminating distractions when you're behind the wheel. The annual Florida "Click-It or Ticket" campaign runs for part of the month of March. It also signals the beginning of spring driving season. "Click-It or Ticket" is when officers, deputies, and state troopers across Florida pay special attention

to drivers and passengers not wearing their seatbelts.

AAA expects that by the end of the year, there will be more than 34 million drivers Nationwide over the age of 65. While senior drivers are thought to be more dangerous out on the roadways, crash statistics do not support that perception. On average, older drivers, even in their mid-to-late 80s, have lower crash rates than drivers in their 20s, according to the AAA Foundation For Traffic Safety.

No matter what your age, safe driving practices should always be on your mind when you're behind the wheel. The latest report from the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) shows total crashes are on the rise in the Sunshine State, while total fatalities were down in 2017, but only 1.89 percent compared to 2016. Florida's seatbelt usage rate continues to hover around 90-percent.

We always recommend wearing your seatbelt. We also encourage drivers to slow down and eliminate distractions. In the age of smart phones and other devices, we may be the most distracted drivers since the invention of the automobile. Studies have shown, in fact, that distracted driving can be just as dangerous as drunk driving, if not more.

It's also important to make sure your mirrors are placed correctly, and your seat is in the right place so that you're comfortable driving. Those are two things we can look at through our CarFit program. CarFit is an education program and checklist that helps keep seniors safe behind the wheel. We typically offer the service at every Senior Expo put on by the City of Coconut Creek. Officer Mike Zombek is certified in CarFit and can help if you're interested in this service. I can also assist if you email me at sleamon@ coconutcreek.net or give me a call in my office at 954-973-6740.

The bottom line is that we want you to be safe when you're out and about on the road. Broward County averages more than 40,000 vehicle crashes per year, more than 200 fatalities, and nearly 25,000 injuries related to traffic crashes. We, of course, have more crashes than many other counties in Florida because we have a lot more people. But as we all know, the only person we can control out on the road is ourselves, which is why good driving habits are so important.



SB 502: Prohibition of Plastic Carryout Bags and Straws:

SB 672: Beverage Container Deposits:



Residents who received the Additional Senior Exemption in 2018 will receive a renewal card in the mail. If you still meet the income requirement, simply sign the renewal card and return it to our office by May 1st so we can ensure you receive this exemption for 2019. Rest assured there is no personal information listed on the renewal postcard. For questions regarding property tax exemptions, please call 954-357-6830.

2019 Homestead Exemption/Save Our Homes Cap Set by the State:

The Florida Department of Revenue has set the 2019 Save Our Homes cap at 1.9%. This cap limits increases to the Assessed/Save Our Homes Value for properties receiving Homestead Exemption to no more than 3% per year or the increase in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) regardless of increases to the just value of the property. This cap results in considerable savings over time for properties with Homestead Exemption. It is important to remember this is not a cap on the actual taxes, but rather a cap on the assessed value of the property.

Important: The Save Our Homes cap begins the year after you receive Homestead Exemption and automatically renews each year. This cap does not cover new construction or construction that was not taxed before the "Save Our Homes"; limit applied to a particular property. Many owners will face a significant increase in property taxes when they purchase a property as the previous owners' exemptions will be removed and the Save Our Homes (SOH) value reset. Florida law requires the SOH value be brought up to the just value of the property when Homestead Exemption is added or removed from the property. For this reason, our office offers a New Homebuyer's Tax Estimator on our website at www.bcpa.net. This estimator allows prospective buyers the ability to plan ahead when purchasing a new home.

The absolute filing deadline for any 2019 exemption is September 18, 2019.

For years, I've kept a now, tattered and coffee-stained note affixed to my computer monitor. It serves as a daily reminder for why I devoted my career to public service and how to conduct my life in general.

It's a simple message. Just two words. But these small words had massive and profound impact on my life and are the guiding principle for every decision I make and for every action I take. The message: "SERVICE = RE-WARD."

Far too often, we put attaining the reward ahead of service. We work because we want a new TV, a nicer car or a bigger house. We forget the higher purpose. To live the fullest and most productive life, we must each focus on providing the best possible service to others ahead of all else. The rewards will come later, often when we least expect it.

These words have been a driving force since I was a little boy growing up in inner-city Philadelphia. My mother largely raised me by herself, my father left when I was young and she worked multiple jobs to make ends meet.



Surrounded by gangs and drugs, I quickly understood I needed to work hard and stay on the "straight and narrow" to pave a path to success.

That led me after high school to move to Tallahassee with just \$500 to my name, but with the dream of playing football at Florida State University under legendary coach, Bobby Bowden. People doubted me at every turn. But I worked hard, proved the doubters wrong and achieved my dream.

After graduating from FSU with a degree in criminology, I put my belief in service into practice. In 2005, I became a police officer with the Coral Springs Police Department. From my first day on the job, I focused on providing the type of diligent and selfless service the residents deserved. That dedication helped me break through the color barrier to become that agency's first black sergeant.

In 2016, I left the department and took a risk to focus full-time on a higher cause. All too aware of the numerous active shooter attacks in the US and mass bombing

tragedies throughout the world, I relocated and formed a company to provide both the public and private sector with active shooter and mass casualty training. I'm proud of the work we performed and had planned to be there for years to come.

That all changed last year on February 14th, with the tragedy at Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School. I headed back down to Broward from my new home in South Carolina to assist the families and community affected by the mass shooting. I sat through every MSD Commission hearing and studied all their reports to determine what went wrong and, most importantly, to find ways to prevent this type of tragedy from ever occurring again.

Because of that experience, I was honored and humbled when the Governor afforded me this incredible opportunity to help protect the 1.9 million residents of Broward County. As sheriff, I'm here to serve. My pledge to you is simple and clear: I will always provide you with the best leadership and service I can. The reward will come in the form of a safer Broward.

Taj Mahal: Is It Really a Love Story?

The Taj Mahal, one of the Seven Wonders of the World, is located in Agra, India about 100 miles south of New Deli. As many as four million tourists tread over the white marble pathways each year. To help preserve the site, the Indian government has raised the price of entry fivefold for Indian visitors only, since Indians make up the greatest number of tourists to this magnificent site. Because of numerous attacks on visitors by monkeys, the government has now introduced catapults and other nonlethal devices to scare away over 15,000 protected monkeys that call the site home.

It is reported that Mughal Emperor, Shah Jahan built the Taj Mahal as the final resting place for his favorite and beloved wife, Mumtaz Mahal. What was special about their relationship, since the Emperor had two wives before he married Mumtaz Mahal and eight more after she died? In any case, the only two bodies in the mausoleum are those of the Emperor and Mumtaz Mahal.


They were both royals and royal marriages have added complications with a certain amount of intrigue. Even for royals, the love story of Shah Jahan and Mumtaz began with some unusual twists and turns. The couple was engaged in 1607, he being fifteen and she fourteen. Because of their Muslim faith, astrologers concluded the stars were not aligned for a favorable marriage until 1612. While



the couple and their parents waited, the Emperor married two other women during the five-year postponement and each wife had one child. These marriages were considered political arrangements which sought to cement alliances.

Once married, the couple bonded like inseparable magnets. She proved to be a person of superior intellect and insight. Because of her input and advice, the Emperor trusted her alone with the imperial seal. When Shah Jahan went to war, she accompanied him in the field. Mumtaz bore the Emperor fourteen children of whom seven survived till adulthood. After thirty hours of labor, Mumtaz died of postpartum hemorrhage delivering her fourteenth child in 1631 at the age of 38.

Even though Shah Jahan suffered from grief



and depression after his wife's death, he commissioned the building of the Taj Mahal and construction began in 1632. It was completed in 1653 at a cost of roughly \$900 million in today's currency and a labor force of over 20,000 workers and artisans. He mourned her until his death in 1666 at the age of 74, and then joined his wife in the Taj Mahal.

What made their relationship special? They really loved each other. It is a true love story, built on friendship, respect, loyalty, and an overwhelming degree of care for the other person. 



JAFCO and Wynmoor

JAFCO is an organization in Sunrise that provides services for abused and neglected children and those with developmental disabilities like autism. The Children's Village is a residential facility where children can live in a safe and loving home and be cared for. JAFCO also has a Family Preservation program to help strengthen families in the South Florida community and The Children's Ability Center to support families raising children with developmental disabilities. JAFCO first started placing children in foster care 26 years ago.

Fast forward: Through the dedication of its volunteers, the generosity of its philanthropic supporters and private fundraising events which supplement government funding, JAFCO has grown into a beautiful gated 5.6-acre residential community.

The JAFCO Children's Village can hold up to 52 children: 16 in its Emergency Shelter and 36 in the six beautifully furnished ranch style group homes, designed for children up to the age of 21 who are not able to safely live with their families.
