Memorial Day is celebrated across the United States. It is an important holiday that remembers those that died for the country, and serves to remind people of the costly price of war. There are many formal ceremonies that take place in observance. Most of these are held in local communities, and can be found by contacting a local Veterans of Foreign Wars office or local city government agency.

When is Memorial Day?

This U.S. federal holiday is celebrated on the last Monday of May to honor the men and women who have died while serving in the military.

Memorial Day History

The custom of honoring ancestors by cleaning cemeteries and decorating graves is an ancient and worldwide tradition, but the specific origin of Memorial Day, or Decoration Day as it was first known, are unclear.

This duty was usually performed in late Summer and was an occasion for family reunions and picnics. After the Civil War, America's need for a secular, patriotic ceremony to honor its deceased military became prominent. Monuments to fallen soldiers were erected and dedicated, and ceremonies centering on the decoration of soldiers' graves were held in towns and cities throughout the nation.

After World War I, the day expanded to honor those who have died in all American wars.

In 1971, Memorial Day became a National holiday by an act of Congress. It is now celebrated on the last Monday in May.

The Poppy, A Symbol of Memorial Day

The wearing of Poppies in honor of America's war dead is traditionally done on Memorial Day. The origin of the Red Poppy as a modern-day symbol of this day was the idea of an American woman, Miss Moina Michael.

Difference Between Memorial Day and Veterans Day

Many people confuse Memorial Day and Veterans Day. Memorial Day is a day for remembering and honoring military personnel who died in the service of their country, particularly those who died in battle or as a result of wounds sustained in battle.

Veterans Day is the day set aside to thank and honor ALL who served in wartime or peacetime, and whether they died or survived. Veterans Day is always observed officially on November 11th, regardless of the day of the week on which it falls.

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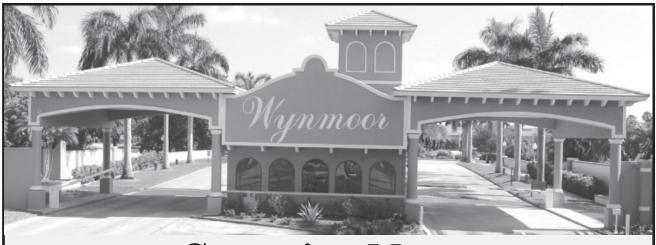

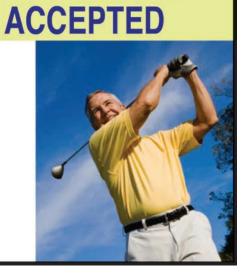

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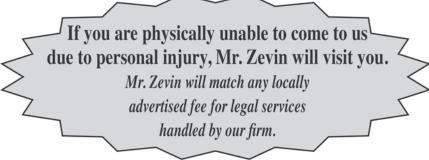

It was rumored at the time "Service Men" of all forces, could be bringing it home! Rumors - panic - fear - frustration - can cause deaths without even having the disease! It sounds so easy to say today. It was a hard lesson to learn, "control" - but we did take the time to listen to medical advice and did our best to follow their directions. We had to, there was nothing else to do to survive!

I today, feel the fear of anxiety of young families, facing the child flu raging in the US for no reason, just a wonderment. "How - Why" and to target the very young? Trying to be logical and reasonable at this time is a large task!

I might feel shielded and retired, now that I am not in the public so much by letting my guard down, but forgetting that the public comes to me in many forms daily.

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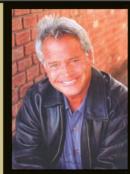
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"The only reason I didn't stay long enough to kill her was because I was already late for my doctor's appointment."

Financial Gifts Can Brighten Anyone's Mother's Day

Mother's Day is fast approaching. This special holiday reminds us of the joy we receive from the powerful bond between mother and child. To help mark the occasion, you may want to consider making certain financial gifts, including the following:

For your mother:

• *IRA contribution* – If your mother is still working, she is eligible to contribute to an IRA, but she might not always fully fund it – so you may want to help. You can't contribute directly to your mother's IRA, but you can write her a check for that purpose, though, of course, she can use the money however she likes. In 2019, the contribution limit for a traditional or Roth IRA is \$6,000, or \$7,000 for individuals 50 or older. (A Roth IRA does have income limits that can reduce the contribution amount or eliminate it altogether.)

• *Insurance premium* – If your mother has life, disability or long-term care insurance, why not offer to pay some of the premiums this year? Long-term care premiums, in particular, can be quite costly, especially for older policyholders.

• Introduction to a financial professional – If your mother doesn't already work with a financial professional, consider introducing her to yours, or to someone else who is recommended by friends or relatives. A financial advisor can help your mother move toward her retirement goals – and, at some point, also can work with legal and tax professionals to assist your mother with her estate plans.

For your children:

• 529 plan contribution – If your children are still of school age, you may want to contribute to a college savings vehicle. One popular choice is a 529

savings plan. When you invest in this plan, your earnings can grow tax-free, provided the money is used for qualified educational expenses. (Be aware, though, that withdrawals not used for qualified education expenses may be subject to federal and state taxes, as well as an additional 10% penalty.)

As the 529 plan owner, you have flexibility in using the money. For example, if you've designated one of your children as the 529 plan's beneficiary, and that child decides not to pursue any higher education, you can switch the beneficiary designation to another child or to yourself.

You can choose the 529 plan offered by any state, but your contributions might be tax deductible if you invest in your own state's plan. Tax issues for 529 plans can be complex, so, before investing, consult with your tax advisor.

• *Shares of stocks* – Giving stock shares to children is a good way to help them learn some of the basics of investing. You can track the progress of their stocks with them, and even do some research together about why prices may be going up or down. By getting children involved early, you may help instill a lifelong interest in investing.

• *Charitable gifts* – Many children are now concerned about various social issues. You can help encourage this involvement – and possibly an appreciation of the value of philanthropy – by making a gift to a charitable group whose work aligns with your child's interests.

We don't need to exchange presents on Mother's Day to show our appreciation for one another, but certain financial gifts can help provide needed support – and even some valuable life lessons – for your loved ones.

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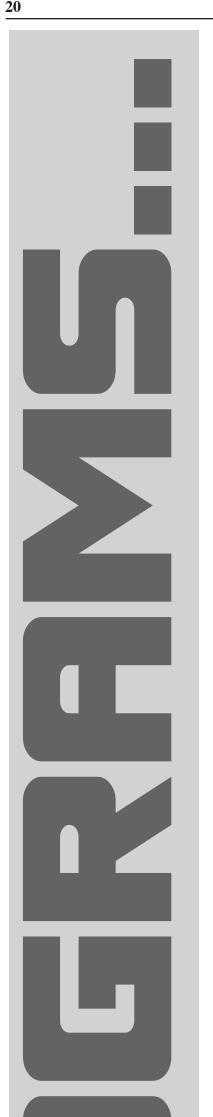

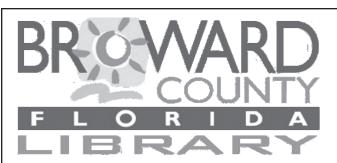

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A Joyful Day At The Lowe Art Museum



n a "Chamber of Commerce" day in early March, I returned to the fine, under-visited Lowe Art Museum on the bustling campus of the University of Miami in Coral Gables. I saw a wonderful temporary exhibit, "The Face of Our Time; Russian Avant-Garde Art from the Bekkerman Collection." This exhibit ends on May 26, 2019. It features an ample display of quality oil paintings by some leading Russian and Ukrainian born painters of the early Twentieth Century. Well-represented at this exhibit were Vladimir Rossine, Boris Grigoriev, David Burliuk, Alexandra Exter, Natalia Goncharova, Nicholas Tarkhoff, Natan Altman, and Robert Falk. Personal favorites of mine at this well-curated exhibit were Natan Altman's, "Woman in Village," Robert Falk's, "Red House." Boris Grigoriev's, "Landscape With Yellow Field." Alexandra Exter's, "Masked Figures By Banks of Venetian Canal." Nicholas Tarkhoff's, "Threshing Wheat," David Burliuk's, "Bathing Beauty," and Vladimr Rossine's, "Woman With Hat." The "Woman With Hat," by Rossine, has some characteristics I have seen in works by Ferdnand Leger.

From the permanent section of Gothic, Renaissance, and Baroque Art of this cozy art museum, I relished fine Gothic Period and Gothic-style Italian paintings by Master of the Blessed Clare, Lippo Vanni, and Sano di Pietro. The Master of the Blessed Claire's, "Adoration of the Magi" done in the Late Gothic Period, has Byzantine characteristics such as striations in the garments of the Virgin and other people in this painting and Byzantine style hands. Lippo Vanni's awesome altarpiece, "Madonna and Child Enthroned With Saints Dominic and Elizabeth" employs egg tempera and gold leaf on wood panel. Sano di Pietro's "Madonna and Christ Child With Saints" was done in the Early Renaissance Period, but this Sienese painting has Gothic features and uses a plethora of gold leaf.

I appreciated fine Renaissance Period Paintings by Guidoccio Cozzarelli, Adriaen Isenbrandt, and Lucas Cranach the Elder. Guidoccio Cozzarelli's, "Annunciation and Journey to Bethlehem and Netherlandish painter, Adriaen Isenbrandt's, "Madonna and Child With Members of Hillensberger Family" showed the development of landscape in Renaissance Period paintings. Lucas Cranach the Elder's "Scholar" is the epitome of the German Renaissance style of portraiture. The Baroque Period and the use of Mannerism was on display when I visited. I saw excellent oil paintings by these Spanish Masters from the Cintas Collection; El Greco, "Feast of Simon," Bartolome Murillo, "Portrait of Gentleman," and Jose Ribera, "Saint Peter," splendid Mannerism. I also saw fine Baroque Period oil paintings on canvas by Sophia Anguissola, "Holy Family With Saints," superb Mannerism and Jacob Jordaens, "Judgement of Paris," very typical of his unique style of painting.

As for their Glass Art Collection which is worthy of accolades, I especially appreciated fine creations by Ginny Ruffner, "Seeing Arizona," Viola Frey, "Artist/Mind/Studio," Robert Arneson, "Nasal Flat," Erwin Fisch, "Picasso and his Imagination," and Ricky Bernstein, "Home Alone," among others.

I highly recommend the Lowe Art Museum with its wide range of art and nice, cozy atmosphere. Seniors over 65 like myself receive a discount on the reasonable price of admission.

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Most people who own a car believe they have "full coverage" for their car insurance. However, as a lawyer who handles personal injury claims, "full coverage" means something very different to me than it may mean to you. In Florida, only two types of coverage are required: personal injury protection (PIP) and property damage liability. It is estimated that one out of three drivers in Florida only have the minimum required coverage. It is important that you be fully protected in the event one of those drivers who injure you due to a rear-end collision or other accident which is not your fault.

Therefore, it is extremely important that you properly protect yourself by carrying a maximum amount of uninsured motorist coverage (U.M.). I recommend

at least \$100,000 per person/\$300,000 per occurrence for each vehicle in your household. If you have more than one vehicle, I strongly recommend "stacking," which allows you to combine your coverage on each of your cars. Stacking is well worth the small additional premium.

Your U.M. coverage also stands for underinsured motorist coverage. This means that you can make a claim against the other driver's insurance and get the total amount available under that policy and still make an additional claim under your U.M. coverage if your injury justifies it.

During my forty years of handling personal injury cases, I have often had

to turn people away who were seriously injured through no fault of their own but did not have U.M. coverage and where the negligent party did not have bodily injury liability coverage.

Trying to go after an individual driver in Florida is an exercise in futility since it will be virtually impossible to collect even if you go to trial and get a judgment against that person. If you do make an uninsured motorist claim with your own company, this should not affect your premium since you were not at fault.

Your uninsured motorist coverage follows you wherever you go. You can make an uninsured motorist claim if you are driving a rental car, driving someone else's car, a passenger, a pedestrian, a bicyclist, or injured in another state. This coverage provides you the maximum

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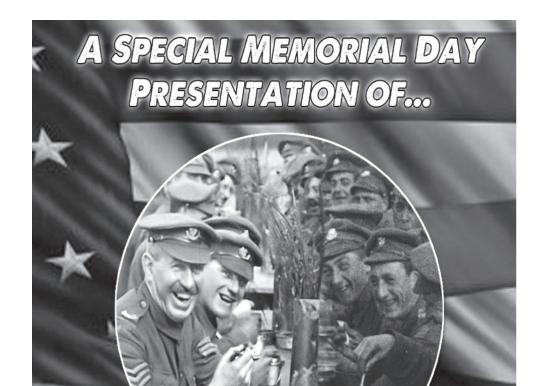

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When I saw patients, I worked long hours, wrote, taught and never really thought about getting older and maybe not being able to perform with the same speed and clarity. From the other side of the couch, I heard my patients talk of not remembering things, or having trouble making decisions, or just not being as sharp. Although I

could understand their fear and concern, I didn't really relate it to me. I had a good physical fitness routine (when I did it), because I had some sense my body would age, but who thought about their brain aging during that time? Not me.

Well, here I am getting older and having trouble finding keys, remembering names and faces, and sometimes appointments as I lose another appointment book. What's going on? Unfortunately, we can't keep our brains from aging. What we can do is slow the process, strengthen our current working brain and sometimes, reverse the damage. That's huge! The brain is resilient and today, we look at brain fitness which the internet describes as, "the ability of the brain to learn what an organism needs in order to survive in a changing environment." Fitting for the 21st Century, I thought a column focusing on brain fitness was innovative. I was surprised to find brain fitness referred to as the new physical fitness and the newest health trend. Let's get with the trend and try to put together a "do-able" program for us. What we can do now and very briefly, here are some general health issues that have serious impact on brain function.

"Very Well Mind" presented a program based on two simple principles for brain fitness - variety and curiosity. Curiosity-it definitely appealed to me. Here are their suggestions and mine:

• Take a class. Any new class. Researchers cite that learning a new language is a top brain fitness technique. Studies are showing that staying intellectually engaged can lower our risk for memory impairment by up to 63%. The recreation department at Wynmoor has great classes. Broward college and library offer more courses and language cafes. Play a new game (like Sudoku or crossword puzzles) for 15-30 minutes a day. Change the game frequently. Be creative. Internet and electronic games count as well.

• Read something totally different. (Join a book club where you don't pick the book).

• Learn a new skill. Join a club you never thought of. (I'm trying Glass Kiln and Stained-Glass Clubs. I never thought I could cut glass or solder).

• Try something completely new. (For me, it was negotiating the New York subway system on a recent visit).

• Meditate to relax and move the brain to a new state for a while. Or sit on your patio for 15 minutes and just look out at the view.

• Exercise to help the brain learn new muscle skills, estimate distance and practice balance. (Exercise increases blood flow to the brain too).

• Add dance with the many opportunities here to learn and enjoy new dances such as social dancing, Belly Dancing, Ballet, and Line Dancing.

• Travel and see new things. Afterwards, tell good stories and show pictures about you and your adventures to friends and family, as this sharing of moments helps the brain solidify memories and interpret events, a surprise tool for brain fitness.

• You are giving your brain a real workout and it can be fun.

Of course, keeping a healthy body is key to keeping a healthy brain. The "Brain Health And Alzheimer's Program" at Loma Linda University concluded that 90% of all Alzheimer's cases could be prevented with changes in lifestyle and eating. Wow!

Briefly, let's start with some food basics. In Wynmoor, going out to eat is a key part of getting together. Start by just being more aware. Hope Myers, President of the Wynmoor Health And Wellness Club and a member for over 50 years of the Academy of "Nutrition and Dietetics," suggests a few tips. Optimize your Vitamin D level and get it tested when you test your cholesterol. Consume foods rich in vitamins B6, folic acid and vitamins b12. Maximize your intake of antioxidant nutrients. Steer clear of the sweetener aspartame which has been shown to speed up brain shrinkage. Briefly, eat a colorful rainbow of fresh fruits and vegetables, lean meats, and healthy fats like olive oil.

Very briefly, here are some more brain healthy food tips:

Add "the increasingly touted" brain foods to your diet such as antioxidants, Omega 3 fatty acids, unsaturated fats and again, fruits and vegetables. Consider adding leafy greens, olives, coconut, avocados, nuts, egg yolks (surprise), quality protein, more fatty fish like salmon, anchovies, and sardines for major impact. Reduce sugar and refined carbs. Check the "Mediterranean Diet" online for more ideas. Again, be creative. Since writing this column, I've been surprised to find my refrigerator is full of salads, veggies and more fish. A super snack has become guacamole with baby carrots and cut peppers and I am trying even more new foods and it's not so bad.

Other important health tips include:

• Limit alcohol which researchers have shown to increase brain shrinkage.

• Maintain a healthy weight by lowering belly fat which can pose particular danger.

• Stop Smoking: hard to do but very important (I know you've heard that before).

• Get enough sleep: A reminder is how hazy your brain feels when you don't get enough sleep. If you can't sleep, you may ask your doctor about sleep apnea. Adequate sleep is key for optimum brain function.

• Check blood pressure, blood sugar, cardiac and cholesterol regularly. I have not focused on brain fitness very much in the past and now, getting older, I don't have time to waste if I want to do everything possible to maintain memory and a stronger working brain. I can't Imagine life without that. So, join me in looking at brain fitness and beginning now. This is just a start.

"Older adults are being arrested for drug offenses and dying from drug overdoses. The most obvious potential explanation is the rising chronic pain leading to opioid prescriptions which has paved a path to addiction. People addicted to pain killers are 40 times more likely to abuse Heroin." Source: Centers for Disease control.

This year's Legislative Session emphasized very significant issues and had remarkable milestones occur. Below, I will discuss an item which I believe will be significantly impactful within our community and the state.

A bill that I filed this legislative session was SB 478, which proposed the re-establishment of the Office of Drug Control within the Executive Office of the Governor. The Office of Drug Control would be managed by a Director, which the Governor would appoint and the Senate would confirm. This office would report

Annually to the Governor and the Legislature on substance abuse trends occurring in Florida, the status and funding of current substance abuse programs and services, and the status of the development and implementation of the state drug control strategy by the office.

Additionally, this office would both educate and inform the public about the substance abuse crisis and available services. It would allow for there to be an institution dedicated to monitoring drugs in our state. Not only would this office help vet harmful drugs in Florida, but it would also play a significant role in reducing adolescent drug and alcohol use through educational campaigns at schools and community projects.

I am pleased to share that, about halfway through the Legislative session, Governor Ron DeSantis signed Executive Order 19-97 re-establishing and restoring this essential Office. The Office of Drug Control would prove to be helpful and dedicated to bettering the overall health of Floridians.

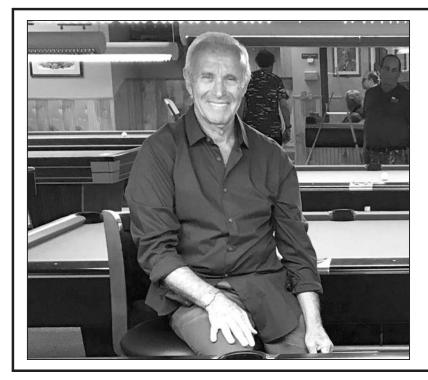

The Summer Of Scams



We are right around the corner from the start of Summer, although you really can't tell it living in South Florida, where we get warm weather year-round. But as the thermometer heats up this time of year, so will the possibilities of being scammed. So, let's run through a few of the most popular scams during the Summertime of the year and how to avoid them.

IRS Scams: Scammers know that a lot of people wait until the last minute to file and will be trying to take advantage of that fact. Remember, that if you get a call out of the blue from

someone posing as an "IRS agent," that it is a scam. Just hang up the phone on them. The IRS does not call you if you owe them money and threaten to throw in jail if you don't pay immediately. They communicate by sending letters. So, don't ignore anything that comes in the mail but do go over it with your accountant, a trusted friend, or a loved one before responding.

Bank Scams: Some studies have estimated that seniors alone lose more than \$30 million Annually falling victim to scams. Scams involving your banking are among the most popular. The same phone call rule above that applies to the IRS also applies to your bank or credit card provider. They will not call you seeking to verify your address (they already have it), make sure your pin number is working (they already know it), or any other reason you can think of. Just like the IRS,

they communicate with you primarily through mail. Each of the banks also have applications that can be downloaded on your smart phone that are very helpful. I would encourage you to go into your bank and talk to them about those applications to make sure you are programming the correct ones into your phone.

Computer Scams: Studies also show that more and more seniors are becoming "tech savvy." In fact, the fastest growing population on Facebook, for example, are folks over the age of 65. If someone calls you all the sudden claiming that your computer has a virus and they can help you fix it by giving them some money, that's a huge red flag that it's a scam. So just hang up. I know I wish every computer I've ever had ran a little faster. How did they know your computer was running slow when you never told anybody? Is my computer even malfunctioning at all? Those are the types of questions I want you to ask yourself... after you've hung up on the guy who called you claiming he can fix your computer.

The bottom line is that I want you to enjoy the Summer and not have to worry about filing police reports and talking to your bank after you've been scammed. As technology advances, so do the ways the bad guys think that they can fleece us. Slow down. Ask yourself, "is this really true?" The scam artists don't want you to stop and think. They want you to go... and act without thinking. So, oftentimes, the best way to avoid being scammed is to ask the question out loud: "Did I really make a mistake on my taxes? I've never had this issue before. Why is my bank calling me now? I've not noticed anything wrong with my computer. Could this person on the phone by lying to me?" When you take the time to say it out loud, you'll see the answer to all three of these questions is very clear: "No. It's a scam."





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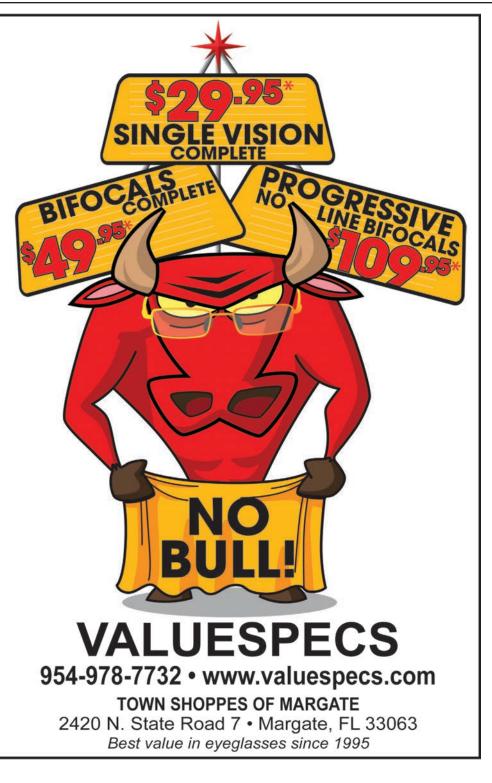
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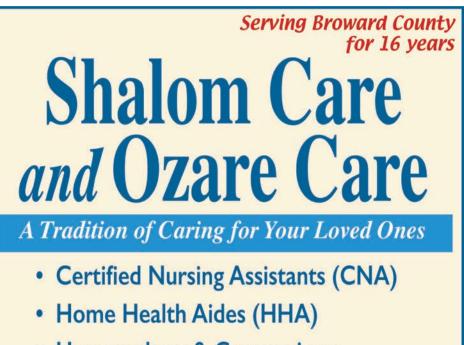

Allow Your Intention To Guide Your Attention

Dear Reader,

Happiness comes from living in alignment with who we truly are. We are most content when we are living a life that is purposeful and in tune with our inner yearnings and nature. 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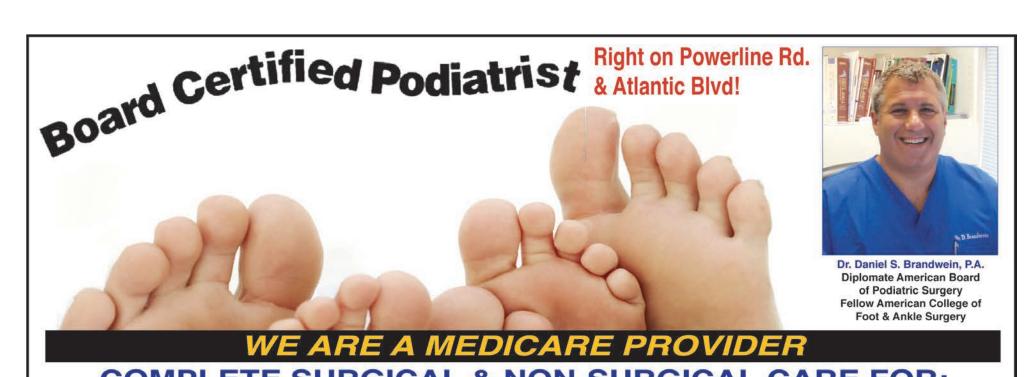

No More Curtain Calls By Beverly Friend

It was April 1st when I heard the news. I hoped it was not true and only an April Fool's spoof. The delightful Broward Stage Door Theatre was closing. Why, after 25 highly successful years in South Florida?

The first, and most obvious guess is that they had bitten off more than they could chew when they left their jewel box of a

theater on Sample Rd in Margate to head for the much larger, elaborate venue in the new Lauderhill Performing Arts Center.

That is certainly a major part of it.

Why, or why did they ever leave Margate? According to Bill Hirschman's writing in *"Florida on Stage*," the city of Margate actually considered buying the original venue and renting it to Stage Door for \$1 a year in order to promote the city's cultural image. Oh, if that had only happened! But it didn't.

The new digs had so much to offer: Beautiful. Bigger. Better. It could accommodate an audience of over 1,000, even though Stage Door cordoned off the seats to hold the usual attendance of around 400.

One big question is whether the audience, mostly senior citizens, would follow them via the Turnpike or driving down State Rd 7, to stop just short of Sunrise to reach the theater. It was a long trip for Wynmoor residents and others. Subscriptions, the life blood of theaters, fell off.

Equally bad, were two calamities, a performance that had to be cancelled when the lead actor failed to show up, and another performance that started one and a half hours late. Ticket prices were refunded for both.

Now, they are lowering the curtain on the last three shows of this season. No one will ever see them perform "*Ghost the Musical*, *Thoroughly Modern Millie*," or "*The Soul of Motor City*." What a loss this is after all their successful artistic successes, highlighted by both traditional and new, original musicals that



set hearts racing, hands clapping and feet tapping in time with the rhythm.

According to Hirschman, in 2000, Stage Door had about 10,000 Season subscribers. This fell to 3,000. Unlike many other companies, Stage Door earned 94 percent of its budget from ticket sales.

As a reviewer for ChicagoOn-

stage.com, I was delighted to be welcomed to review their plays over these past 13 years. This modern approach transcends newspapers by providing links to on -line reviews when they are posted on the theater's web site, making them available to all readers, not merely those in Chicago or in any distant location.

Along with many other theater aficionados, I will sorely miss them.

In a generous show of camaraderie, Slow Burn Theater Company and the Broward Center for the Performing Arts will accommodate ticket buyers who are affected by the closure. Please call the Lauderdale Performing Arts Center Box Office at 954-777-2055.

"Stage Door has passionately pursued its mission to preserve the 'Great American Musical.' We have shared the stages with thespians, creators, writers, directors and crew from all walks of life and from all corners of the globe. The unforgettable memories will forever define a generation.

The Stage Door Theatre made its final curtain call on Wednesday, March 20th, 2019 with our finale performance of "**My One and Only,"** as we call a wrap on 26 seasons serving the South Florida community.

While the stage is darkened, the beating heart within our nonprofit organization remains as we attend to many financial obligations yet to fulfill. Your continued donor support will help us make a graceful exit from the stage. Please donate today."

As sheriff, I hold an important responsibility to protect our

community's children and encourage their positive development. The incredible people I meet around Broward leaves me optimistic about our county's future.

I also know many potential obstacles await our next generation at every turn and how even one small mistake could derail these young people from achieving their full potential. No one should have their future destroyed because of a minor, youthful indiscretion. Kids make mistakes and bad choices. It is part of growing up. Learning





Our efforts are also focused on proactive measures to keep kids from committing crimes in the first place. I was raised largely by my mother in inner-city Philadelphia and understand both the detriment of not having mentors and of how many in minority communities distrust law enforcement. At BSO, we are tackling both issues through a host of bold initiatives.

First, we are expanding our Law Enforcement Explorers Program, which exposes teenagers to positive values and role models. I will also be introducing the BSO Internship Initiative for individuals interested in a career in public

from those mistakes is what allows children to grow into productive members of society.

For many, however, these minor indiscretions create farreaching consequences that can amount to a life sentence of lost opportunities. This stark reality is even clearer in struggling working-class communities and communities of color, which are historically disproportionally impacted.

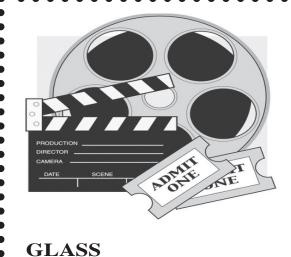
As sheriff, I am promoting restorative justice programs that provide individuals who commit a minor offense with a second chance at leading a productive life. Instead of a permanent arrest record, which could severely limit opportunities in adulthood, a youth who commits a minor offense would enter a restorative justice program. These programs hold the offender to account and provide them with the assistance they need and teach them the discipline, structure, dignity and responsibility necessary to become productive citizens.

These programs are a proven success, showing significantly lower recidivism rates among participants. They also save millions of dollars that would otherwise be spent on less effective juvenile criminal justice system operations. But, these programs are not a mere slap on the wrist. Individuals who commit non-minor offenses and repeat offenders know they will feel the full force of the law. safety. Too often, community members interact with deputies only at the worst of times. This program allows for a better understanding of our goals and mission and allows

us better insights into the communities we protect. In addition, because many struggle to pay for school, BSO is developing a criminal justice scholarship program to ease the financial burden. These scholarships are an investment in the future of law enforcement and our communities.

Finally, I am reexamining how the money seized from the proceeds of criminal activity is distributed to community-based nonprofit organizations to support important local programs. Programs that benefit from this Law Enforcement Trust Fund are vital to our mission of connecting with youth and providing programs, mentorships and assistance to them. In the past, distribution was woefully inequitable, with a select few organizations receiving the bulk of the money. I don't believe in playing favorites, and we will work to ensure that all qualified organizations receive a fair opportunity to compete for funds and that the money will be distributed equitably to the most deserving.

I am humbled by the important role the Sheriff plays in the lives of our county's children and I pledge to do my all to ensure their future success. Service Equals Reward.

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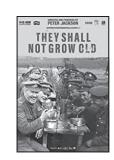

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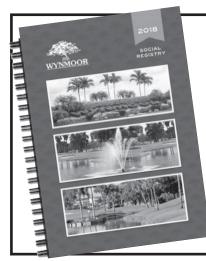

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Early Time Mother's Day

Mother's Day, when children's hearts were full of love! And school teachers helped young students to make flower baskets with lots of shiny brass tacks, pretty enough to fill with flower candy, or different things for mother on her day. Flowers were a luxury in my day. Walking home from school that day, I passed a house that had plenty of flowers to spare.

I stopped to pick a few to fill my basket for mom, happy to get on with my surprise. When I looked up, there was a friendly policeman standing there. He took my hand and said, "I will help you with that heavy load!"

My basket flowed over with tulips and daffodils. "Get in my car and I will drive you home. I turned to look, standing there with hands on her hip was a mean ol' lady waving "bye bye," a scene I remember each Mother's Day. The policeman said, "You stole someone's love you know, to make your basket of love for your mom. That was wrong. I will let you out of the car at your corner," as he handed me a quarter and said, "Throw those flowers away and buy some that will truly be from your heart." A quarter in those days went a long way. I often wondered if that good man missed his lunch that day?



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Ching Shih was a prostitute on a floating brothel in a tributary that flowed into the South China Sea. Yes, she was strikingly beautiful, but no one could imagine her potential and giftedness. A fierce notorious pirate named Cheng 1 (Zhèng Yi) took a liking to her and after several discussions, or as we would call it today, a prenuptial agreement, they married in 1801. According to the agreement, she was to share equally in booty and serve with position and power in the pirate organization. She proved herself at every level.

Pirating in those days was big business, which consisted of more than one or two ships flying the skull and crossbones, attacking merchant vessels. At the time of their marriage, Ching Shih and Cheng 1 commanded 200 ships and this floating arsenal was called the "Red Flag Fleet." As the Red Flag Fleet grew, they formed a coalition with another fleet and their combined numbers were 600 ships and 50,000 -70,000 pirates. It was a massive force that challenged China's Qing government, the Portuguese Empire, as well as the British Empire. The Red Flag Fleet functioned as a Nation unto themselves.

The pirate coalition, and especially the Red Flag Fleet, faced a crisis when Ching Shih's husband died. What would hold the coalition together? Who would be in command? Ching Shih moved with laser speed and surgical precision. First, she contacted Cheng's most influential pirate family members. Next, she met with captains of other fleets and ships, and then she positioned her most trusted allies in critical positions of authority.

At the end of the day, she ruled. The only concession was she had to make a male head of the entire fleet. How effective was she? The pirate coalition grew to 1700-1800 vessels with over 120.000 pirates. Remember this is a pirate organization. Pirates rob, steal and kill people. None of them would be found guilty of attending Sunday School classes. Ching developed a code that all coalition pirates had to obey. Some of the code regulated how booty was shared and a chain of command that instilled consistent authority throughout the fleets.

The most pronounced rules dealt with how pirates treated female captives. Any captain or pirate raping a female captive faced instant death. A captain or pirate could take a beautiful female captive for a wife, but he had to be faithful. If not, he was punished severely with flogging, prison, or torture. Ching Shih may have been one of the first feminists.

Her story takes a strange turn. Her fleets were battling the Chinese government, the Portuguese government, the British government, and other pirates. After several major losses, the Chinese government offered amnesty if the pirates returned the loot and bowed before the Chinese magistrate. Chang Pao, a boy that Ching Shih and Cheng 1 adopted, was negotiating with a Chinese official. Discussion broke down over the loot and the pirates bowing. Ching Shih approached the Chinese and after tough negotiations, the pirates were able to keep all their acquired loot. Bowing before the Chinese magistrate was addressed in one of most creative negotiations ever. Ching and her adopted son were first dissolved as mother and son. Then the magistrates married the two, who bowed to the magistrate to thank him for officiating the ceremony.

Ching Shih gave up piracy and settled on the mainland. She set up a casino and brothel which she managed until her death in 1844.









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I have been writing columns and/or articles for the past 17 consecutive years and also in the early eighties when I was specializing in eating disorders and wrote on that subject for a newspaper in Brooklyn.

In all that time, I don't think I touched on a very important issue and I think I was remiss in overlooking something so important.

The subject is forgiveness. Forgiveness toward self, others, and the universe in general. As you probably know, or have already heard,

forgiveness is in no way saying that whatever was done is now OK with you. It doesn't condone bad or hurtful behavior. It doesn't relieve responsibility. It does, however, give the forgiver peace. If it is true forgiveness, which is the only kind that works, it alleviates bitterness, resentment, anger and emotional/ physical pain. If you don't forgive, who are you hurting? Forgiveness is just a letting go of those feelings that are making you suffer mentally, emotionally and very importantly, physically.

Last month, I wrote about thoughts being things and having energy and the ability to impact you and your world. I asked you to imagine having a wonderful thought and then a painful one to see how these thoughts effected your body. If you do this with forgiveness, you will see that when you hold on to your pain, your body responds in kind, but if you can imagine letting go of anger and resentment, your body will also respond. This is such an important phenomenon to understand and practice. You are creating the sensations in your body.

So, what happens when you hold on tightly to the bitterness and resentment from something that you cannot forgive? Your muscles tense, your blood pressure goes up, your pulse rate goes up, your stomach clenches as does your jaw and the muscles in your neck and head. Even your arteries constrict and cortisol is produced in your body which is known as a stress hormone. All of this can't be good for you and your health.

I've been interested in the mind/body connection for many years and next week I am beginning a two-month course focusing on this from a physical, psychological and spiritual perspective. I would love to learn something I haven't heard already but even if I don't, I know it will serve to reinforce my views and keep me focused on what causes both adverse and positive results in my body.

We all know about the reactions the body has to ongoing negative stress and anger and how we can counteract them through meditation, prayer, yoga, laughter, lovingness and many other means. Forgiveness is definitely one of those ways. Start to practice forgiveness with something small. Maybe someone cut you off on the road and your initial reaction was anger. That's something that will usually go away by itself unless we keep telling the story to others. But, if you are proactive and forgive the person immediately and consciously, even saying, "I forgive you for cutting me off and nearly running me off the road" while taking a deep breath, you will be learning a skill that will serve you, regardless of the magnitude of the wrong that you believe was done to you. When you can get to something that you never believed you could forgive, (even of yourself) and you see that you have let it go and it no longer has an impact on you, you will know that you can do this now with any negative emotion that you have. Remember, you created the negative emotion and therefore you are the only want who can uncreate it.

WYNMOOR **Golf** and **Tips** By Kevin Battersby, PGA

Summer Tips

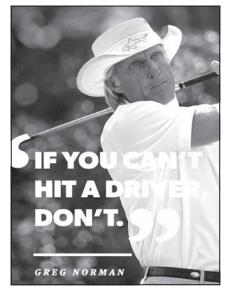
Whether you're starting your golf Season up North or living here at Wynmoor, here are some tips and ideas you may consider this golf Season.

If you are struggling with your driver, try gripping down on the club up to an inch for more on center hits. Also, many players find

they have more accuracy and even distance with their three wood off the tee instead of their driver.

Employ the use of a utility club or high lofted fairway wood. A 7 or 9 wood is usually easier to hit off the tight lies and you may find your distance is nearly the same as your 3 or 5 wood. If your fairway woods are still troubling you, choosing a 5, 4, or 3 hybrids from the fairway should still provide you with ample distance for a short third shot to be green. In short, any time the club length is shorter, more center hits can be attained.

Personally, I have had bouts of arthritis in my fingers. The use of a midsize grip alleviated my condition as I didn't have to squeeze as much in my grip. I found the jumbo grip was too large for me but if you have large hands you can give it a try. For the ladies, extra wraps of tape under the grip may suffice in the same context.



If you're not using graphite shafts in your clubs, give it a try. The lighter shafts provide more speed especially with the longest clubs and there is less shock and vibration going up the shaft than the steel shafts which helps with elbow, shoulder and some back issues.

In closing, remember what Greg Norman said about drivers. Have a great golfing Summer.

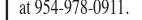
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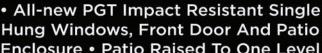
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
