Five reasons why COVID herd immunity is probably impossible

Even with vaccination efforts in full force, the theoretical threshold for vanquishing COVID-19 looks to be out of reach.

As COVID-19 vaccination rates pick up around the world, people have reasonably begun to ask: how much longer will this pandemic last? It's an issue surrounded with uncertainties. But the once-popular idea that enough people will eventually gain immunity to SARS-CoV-2 to block most transmission — a 'herdimmunity threshold' — is starting to look unlikely.

That threshold is generally **achiev**able only with high vaccination rates, and many scientists had thought that once people started being immunized in mass, herd immunity would permit society to return to normal. Most estimates had placed the threshold at 60-70% of the population gaining immunity, either through vaccinations or past exposure to the virus. But as the pandemic enters its second year, the thinking has begun to shift. In February, independent data scientist Youyang Gu changed the name of his popular **COVID-19 forecasting model** from 'Path to Herd Immunity' to 'Path to Normality.' He said that reaching a herd-immunity threshold was looking unlikely because of factors such as vaccine hesitancy, the emergence of new variants and the delayed arrival of vaccinations for children.

Gu is a data scientist, but his thinking aligns with that of many in the epidemiology community. "We're moving away from the idea that we'll hit the herd-immunity threshold and then the pandemic will go away for good," says epidemiologist Lauren Ancel Meyers, Executive Director of the University of Texas at Austin COVID-19 Modeling Consortium. This shift reflects the complexities and challenges of the pandemic, and

shouldn't overshadow the fact that vaccination is helping. "The vaccine will mean that the virus will start to dissipate on its own," Meyers says. But as new variants arise and immunity from infections potentially wanes, "we may find ourselves months or a year down the road still battling the threat, and having to deal with future surges."

Long-term prospects for the pandemic probably include **COVID-19** becoming an endemic disease, much like influenza. But in the near term, scientists are contemplating a new normal that does not include herd immunity. Here are some of the reasons behind this mindset, and what they mean for the next year of the pandemic.

It's unclear whether vaccines prevent transmission

The key to herd immunity is that, even if a person becomes infected, there are too few susceptible hosts around to maintain transmission — those who have been vaccinated or have already had the infection cannot contract and spread the virus. The COVID-19 vaccines developed by Moderna and Pfizer–BioNTech, for example, are extremely effective at preventing symptomatic disease, but it is still unclear whether they protect people from becoming infected, or from spreading the virus to others. That poses a problem for herd immunity.

"Herd immunity is only relevant if we have a transmission-blocking vaccine. If we don't, then the only way to get herd immunity in the population is to give everyone the vaccine," says Shweta Bansal, a mathematical biologist at Georgetown University in Washington DC. Vaccine effectiveness for halting transmission needs to be "pretty darn"

high" for herd immunity to matter, she says, and at the moment, **the data aren't conclusive**. "The Moderna and Pfizer data look quite encouraging," she says, but exactly how well these and other vaccines stop people from transmitting the virus will have big implications.

A vaccine's ability to block transmission doesn't need to be 100% to make a difference. Even 70% effectiveness would be "amazing," says Samuel Scarpino, a network scientist who studies infectious diseases at Northeastern University in Boston, Massachusetts. But there could still be a substantial amount of virus spread that would make it a lot harder to break transmission chains.

Vaccine roll-out is uneven

The speed and distribution of vaccine roll-outs matters for various reasons, says Matt Ferrari, an epidemiologist at Pennsylvania State University's Center for Infectious Disease Dynamics in University

Park. A perfectly coordinated global campaign could have wiped out COVID-19, he says, at least theoretically. "It's a technically feasible thing, but in reality it's very unlikely that we will achieve that on a global scale," he says. There are huge variations in the efficiency of vaccine roll-outs between countries (see 'Disparities in distribution'), and even within them.

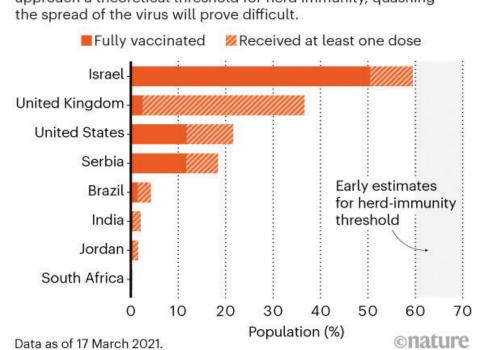

Israel began vaccinating its citizens in December 2020, and thanks in part to a deal with Pfizer–BioNTech to share data in exchange for vaccine doses, it currently leads the world in terms of roll-out. Early in the campaign, health workers were vaccinating more than 1% of Israel's population every day, says Dvir Aran, a biomedical data scientist at the Technion — Israel Institute of Technology in Haifa. As of mid-March, around 50% of the country's

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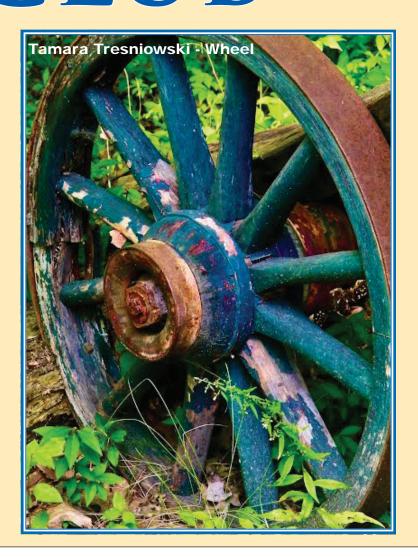
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An Indoor Utah Gem With Fine European Paintings

Before heading to Moab, Utah to savor the beauty of Arches and Canyonlands National Parks, I spent an enriching day at the Utah Museum of Fine Arts. This art museum is located on the sprawling campus of the University of Utah. It has fine samples of quality European Paintings from the Renaissance Period, Baroque Period, 18th Century, and 19th Century.

It has a small, but captivating collection of Renaissance Period Paintings produced by Italian, Spanish, Netherlandish, and German Painters. Devotional theme favorites of mine that day were Polidoro di Bartolomeo's "Crucifixion With Saints," fresco on canvas, Francesco di Ubertni, also called Bacchiacca's "Saint John the Baptist In the Wilderness," Adriean Isenbrant's "Madonna and Christ Child," Master of Santa Maria De La Hoz' "Saint John the Baptist," and Master of Compana Tondo's "Adoration of Christ Child." All of these paintings typical of the Renaissance Period have landscapes in the background.

The Later Renaissance Period Paintings in this art museum depict the prosperous people of the period such as; Pier Francesco Foschi's "Young Man Weaving Wreath of Flowers" and Ambrosius Benson's "Elegant Couples Dancing."

At this art museum, I saw fine Baroque Period Paintings by Italian, Flemish, French, and Dutch Painters. I especially enjoyed Pieter Breughel the Elder's "Maypole Dance," reminiscent of a Bacchanal, Andrea Vaccaro's fine Tenebrist Painting, "Martha Rebuking Mary Magdalene," and Vincent Van De Vinne's stillife, "Memento Mori." This art museum has a fine collection of Minor 17th Century Dutch Master Paintings including delightful paintings by Jan Verkolje, "Musical Party," Melchior D'Hondecoeter, "Birds in Landscape," and Pieter Cosyn, "View of Leiden."

From the 18th Century, I saw impressive European Oil Paintings by Gian Paolo Pannini, "Capriccio of Rome With Ruins," Marie Louise Vigee-Lebrun, "Princess Evdokia Golitsyna As Flora," Etienne de Lavalle, "Anacron, Eros, Sappho, and Female Dancer," and American John Copley.

Their collection of 19th Century European Paintings reflected the conservative tastes of the Salt Lake City Art Community. However, I relished its quality paintings by Jean Leon Gerome, "Christian Martyr's Last Prayer," Charles Daubigny's "River" with its fine reflections, and Narcise De La Pena's "Forest Pool." I was also fascinated with Armand Guillaumin's fine French Expressionist Painting, "Le Maison Nannette A Crozant."

The Utah Museum of Fine Arts also has a fine collection of paintings produced by Utah-connected Painters such as; Alfred Lambourne, "Sunset At Platte," Henry Culmer, "View of Salt Lake Valley," and Louise Farnsworth, "Blue Shadows."

This art museum is a less discovered gem which I especially appreciated on this hot over 100 degree July day.

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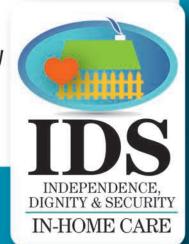


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Travel During The Corona Virus - My trip to Israel

It is for the protection of all the citizens and worked so very well. Written in English and Hebrew, these regulations were designed for our protection and I followed all that I understood! population has been fully vaccinated with the two doses required for protection. "Now the problem is that young people don't want to get their shots," Aran says, so local authorities are enticing them with things such as free pizza and beer. Meanwhile, Israel's neighbours Lebanon, Syria, Jordan and Egypt have yet to vaccinate even 1% of their respective populations.

Across the United States, access to vaccines has been uneven. Some states, such as Georgia and Utah, have fully vaccinated less than 10% of their populations, whereas Alaska and New Mexico have fully vaccinated more than 16%.

In most countries, vaccine distribution is stratified by age, with priority given to older people, who are at the highest risk of dying from COVID-19. When and whether there will be a vaccine approved for children, however, remains to be seen. Pfizer—BioNTech and Moderna have now enrolled teens in clinical trials of their vaccines, and the Oxford—AstraZeneca and Sinovac Biotech vaccines are being tested in children as young as three. But results are still months away. If it's not possible to vaccinate children, many more adults would need to be immunized to achieve herd immunity, Bansal says. (Those aged 16 and older can receive the Pfizer—BioNTech vaccine, but other vaccines are approved only for ages 18 and up.) In the United States, for example, 24% of people are under 18 years old (according to 2010 census data). If most under-18s can't receive the vaccine, 100% of over-18s will have to be vaccinated to reach 76% immunity in the population.

Another important thing to consider, Bansal says, is the geographical structure of herd immunity. "No community is an island, and the landscape of immunity that surrounds a community really matters," she says. COVID-19 has occurred in clusters across the United States as a result of people's behaviour or local policies. Previous vaccination efforts suggest that uptake will tend to cluster geographically, too, Bansal adds. Localized resistance to the measles vaccination, for example, has resulted in small pockets of disease resurgence. "Geographic clustering is going to make the path to herd immunity a lot less of a straight line, and essentially means we'll be playing a game of whack-a-mole with COVID outbreaks." Even for a country with high vaccination rates, such as Israel, if surrounding countries haven't done the same and populations are able to mix, the potential for new outbreaks remains

New variants change the herd-immunity equation

Even as vaccine roll-out plans face distribution and allocation hurdles, new variants of SARS-CoV-2 are sprouting up that might be more transmissible and resistant to vaccines. "We're in a race with the new variants," says Sara Del Valle, a mathematical and computational epidemiologist at Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico. The longer it takes to stem transmission of the virus, the more time these variants have to emerge and spread, she says.

What's happening in Brazil offers a cautionary tale. Research published in *Science* suggests that the slowdown of COVID-19 in the city of Manaus between May and October might have been attributable to herd-immunity effects (L. F. Buss *et al. Science* 371, 288–292; 2021). The area had been severely hit by the disease, and immunologist Ester Sabino at the University of São Paulo, Brazil, and her colleagues calculated that more than 60% of the population had been infected by June 2020. According to some estimates, that should have been enough to get the population to the herd-immunity threshold, but

in January Manaus saw a huge resurgence in cases. This spike happened after the emergence of a new variant known as P.1, which suggests that previous infections did not confer broad protection to the virus. "In January, 100% of the cases in Manaus were caused by P.1," Sabino says. Scarpino suspects that the 60% figure might have been an overestimate. Even so, he says, "You still have resurgence in the face of a high level of immunity."

There's another problem to contend with as immunity grows in a population, Ferrari says. Higher rates of immunity can create selective pressure, which would favour variants that are able to infect people who have been immunized. Vaccinating quickly and thoroughly can prevent a new variant from gaining a foothold. But again, the unevenness of vaccine roll-outs creates a challenge, Ferrari says. "You've got a fair bit of immunity, but you still have a fair bit of disease, and you're stuck in the middle." Vaccines will almost inevitably create new evolutionary pressures that produce variants, which is a good reason to build infrastructure and processes to monitor for them, he adds.

Immunity might not last forever

Calculations for herd immunity consider two sources of individual immunity — vaccines and natural infection. People who have been infected with SARS-CoV-2 seem to develop some immunity to the virus, but how long that lasts remains a question, Bansal says. Given what's known about other coronaviruses and the preliminary evidence for SARS-CoV-2, it seems that infection-associated immunity wanes over time, so that needs to be factored in to calculations. "We're still lacking conclusive data on waning immunity, but we do know it's not zero and not 100," Bansal says.

Modellers won't be able to count everybody who's been infected when calculating how close a population has come to the herd-immunity threshold. And they'll have to account for the fact that the vaccines are not 100% effective. If infection-based immunity lasts only for something like months, that provides a tight deadline for delivering vaccines. It will also be important to understand how long vaccine-based immunity lasts, and whether boosters are necessary over time. For both these reasons, COVID-19 could become like the flu.

Vaccines might change human behaviour

At current vaccination rates, Israel is closing in on the theoretical herd-immunity threshold, Aran says. The problem is that, as more people are vaccinated, they will increase their interactions, and that changes the herd-immunity equation, which relies in part on how many people are being exposed to the virus. "The vaccine is not bulletproof," he says. Imagine that a vaccine offers 90% protection: "If before the vaccine you met at most one person, and now with vaccines you meet ten people, you're back to square one."

The most challenging aspects of modelling COVID-19 are the sociological components, Meyers says. "What we know about human behaviour up until now is really thrown out of the window because we are living in unprecedented times and behaving in unprecedented ways." Meyers and others are trying to adjust their models on the fly to account for shifts in behaviours such as mask wearing and social distancing.

Non-pharmaceutical interventions will continue to play a crucial part in keeping cases down, Del Valle says. The whole point is to break the

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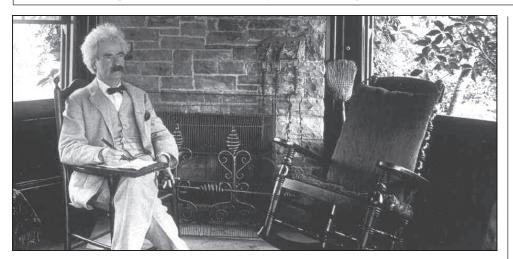

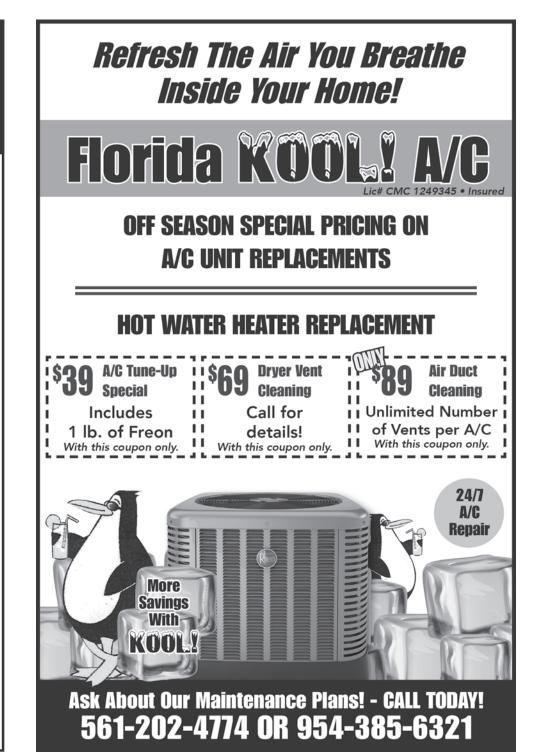
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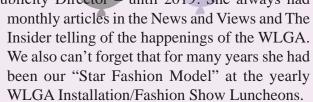

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Our office recently mailed over 776,000 TRIM (proposed tax) Notices to Broward County property owners. Florida law requires the property appraiser to assess every parcel of real and tangible personal property in Broward County as of January 1, 2021. The 2021 just values are based on the 2020 market data. The TRIM Notice you received shows your 2021 just value, exemptions you are receiving, and the proposed tax amounts as set by the various taxing authorities listed on the notice. It is important to remember the Property Appraiser's Office does not set or collect taxes.

If you believe you are entitled to a Homestead Exemption or any other exemptions not shown on your TRIM Notice, you may still late file for any 2021 exemption until September 20, 2021. If you have questions or concerns about any of the proposed tax rates or non-ad valorem fees, including fire assessments, please contact the taxing authority listed on the TRIM Notice.

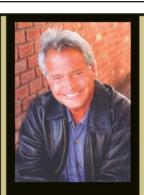
The ABSOLUTE deadline to file an application for any 2021 exemption or appeal your property's just value is September 20, 2021.

Value Adjustment Board

The Value Adjustment Board (VAB) is an independent quasi-judicial review board. If you believe your property assessment is not what a buyer would have reasonably paid for your property on January 1,2021, you should first contact our office. If after speaking with one of our appraisers, you still do not agree, you can file an appeal with the Broward County Value Adjustment Board. If you were denied an exemption, you may also file an appeal with the Value Adjustment Board challenging this denial. The absolute filing deadline for Value Adjustment Board petitions is September 20, 2021. 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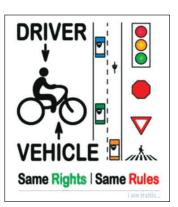
In Florida, the bicycle is legally defined as a vehicle and the bicyclist is a driver. Bicyclists have the same rights to the roadways, and must obey the same traffic laws as the drivers of other vehicles.

These laws include stopping for stop signs and red lights, riding with the flow of traffic, using lights at night, yielding the right of way when entering a roadway and yielding to pedestrians in a crosswalk.

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Light Up to Ride Out

Safety Tips for Cycling in the Dark



Below are a few tips that will help you stay safe while riding in the dark.

Lights: Having lights on your bike is vitally important to night riding - to see where you're going, of course, but more importantly, to be seen by others. Having lights on your bike is the law. At a minimum, you should have a white constant light in the front and a blinking red light at the rear.

Reflectives: While lights are obviously critical for riding at night, don't discount the value of reflective clothing or tape. The idea is to make yourself as visible as possible. Adding reflective tape to your bike frame can also be an option.

Plan your route: Depending on what you want to get out of your ride, whether it's a structured training session or just a case of getting the miles in, plan ahead and have a route in your head or on a computer. Try to choose routes you're very familiar with when biking at night.

Ride with a partner or group: Riding with a friend or a group is a good way to approach night rides. Having a group of friends is a good incentive and just the motivation you might need to head out into the dark. There is also safety in numbers.



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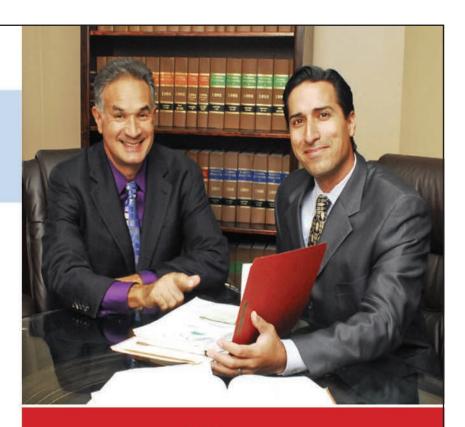

transmission path, she says, and limiting social contact and continuing protective behaviours such as masking can help to reduce the spread of new variants while vaccines are rolling out.

But it's going to be hard to stop people reverting to pre-pandemic behaviour. Texas and some other US state governments are already lifting mask mandates, even though substantial proportions of their populations remain unprotected. It's frustrating to see people easing off these protective behaviours right now, Scarpino says, because continuing with measures that seem to be working, such as limiting indoor gatherings, could go a long way to helping end the pandemic. The herd-immunity threshold is "not a 'we're safe' threshold, it's a 'we're safer' threshold," Scarpino says. Even after the threshold has been passed, isolated outbreaks will still occur.

To understand the additive effects of behaviour and immunity, consider that this flu season has been unusually mild. "Influenza is probably not less transmissible than COVID-19," Scarpino says. "Almost certainly, the reason why flu did not show up this year is because we typically have about 30% of the population immune because they've been infected in previous years, and you get vaccination covering maybe another 30%. So you're probably sitting at 60% or so immune." Add mask wearing and social distancing, and "the flu just can't make it," Scarpino says. This back-of-the-envelope calculation shows how behaviour can change the equation, and why more people would need to be immunized to attain herd immunity as people stop practicing behaviors such as social distancing.

Ending transmission of the virus is one way to return to normal. But another could be preventing severe disease and death, says Stefan Flasche, a vaccine epidemiologist at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine. Given what is known about COVID-19 so far, "reaching herd immunity through vaccines alone is going to be rather unlikely," he says. It's time for more realistic expectations. The vaccine is "an absolutely astonishing development," but it's unlikely to completely halt the spread, so we need to think of how we can live with the virus, Flasche says. This isn't as grim as it might sound. Even without herd immunity, the ability to vaccinate vulnerable people seems to be reducing hospitalizations and deaths from COVID-19. The disease might not disappear any time soon, but its prominence is likely

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur

Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are the High Holy days of the Jewish religion. Rosh Hashanah marks the

anniversary of the biblical story of creation of the first humans, Adam and Eve and this year begins on the evening of September 6th. It is considered the Jewish New Year. Yom Kippur beginning on September 15th and continuing through the 16th marks a time of thoughtful reflection, thinking deeply about the past year and making very personal amends for your own wrongdoings in the past year. It is a time of reflection, prayer, and repentance. It is a time of awe.

As ever my column takes on a note of curiosity even at this most sacred time. I note the many empty seats at some of the weekly services and thought about the overflowing crowds at the High Holy Days. Why? What might draw people to synagogue at this time. I had my own ideas but turned to some of the experts with my question. For the first time I turn to last month's column for a few thoughts worth repeating.

Our Wynmoor community has been lucky to have two esteemed Rabbis that live here, and I asked their thoughts. Rabbi Stuart Berman has had a stellar and varied career. He has had a pulpit practice and was a Rabbi Emeritus at Temple Sinai in Forest Hills New York. He has lectured widely in religious and secular venues, including cruise ships. He was also a Chaplain for the NYPD. He has written for the Insider newspaper. He states "Often people come for these three days to wipe their slate clean and start over. There are ten days to think deeply about your life, to look back and make changes and amends. There are ten days of penitence and a chance to do better." He and I agree that there is also an element of tradition. Feeling roots and memories of family and for many of past holidays and how meaningful they were in growing up. Powerful childhood memories may be a part of the holidays. In the present, beyond the spiritual there is also a time between services with family and friends that is significant.

Rabbi David Spitz was an Army Chaplain for two years both stateside and in Korea. He led congregations in North Hollywood, California, Munster, Indiana, Chicago, Illinois, Cleveland, Ohio, and Rochester, New York. He was a Hospital Chaplain for 26 years working with the Veterans Administration in Chicago. Rabbi Spitz saw the holidays as an important spiritual renewal.



He talks about tradition and a return to Jewish ways. He sees the Kaddish (memorial prayers for the deceased) as a reawakening. He also talks about getting together with other Jews over not only prayers but also community and traditional food. Like Rabbi Berman and myself he talks about childhood things and the powerful memories associated with these holidays.

My friend Donna Goldman puts it beautifully "For some who don't come much during the year they feel the need at holiday time. It is a personal need for fulfillment, peace with yourself and with God."

I asked a few friends here for a quick and meaningful holiday memory. Here are a few of the responses.

Jack Mendelson remembered an early dinner with family. He thought of the good food, his uncles, cousins, and brothers, and – the warmth of family. He and his father and brothers then went to Schul. A humorous memory centered around the male members of the Mendelson family trying to loudly out sing their friends the Landaus.

Olivia Hammer recalls going to Synagogue and finding her reserved seat on row 14 already taken. She moved back to row 15 where she was seated next to a young man named Lenny. He asked her for her number, and she said she didn't write on the holiday. That was the beginning of a long and so very special marriage. So many of the people here in Wynmoor knew and loved Lenny Hammer. What a wonderful holiday memory.

Fane Brenner remembers going to Synagogue in the twelfth grade and feeling the special comfort of a small group of friends she had known for a long time. She feels the same about her current Rabbi in Baltimore. It is complete comfort and warmth. And when he speaks it feels like he is speaking only to her.

For me the holidays are all of the above. I feel a strong sense of community with people I don't see when I am in Florida. I feel a deep sense of self reflection and repentance for some of the deeds of the past year. I pray to be a better person in the next year. I feel a certain awe being in God's presence that is somehow a little different than the rest of the year. The songs and prayers I recited from childhood on, I repeat again. And, I remember the sense of wellbeing I felt as a young child as I held my grandfather's hand helping him to Schul. When we arrived, I found him a seat and turned the pages for him. I was so proud. I was six years old. Memories I will never forget.





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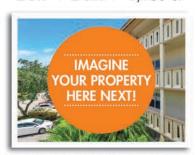


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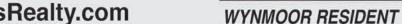


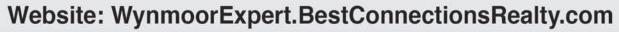
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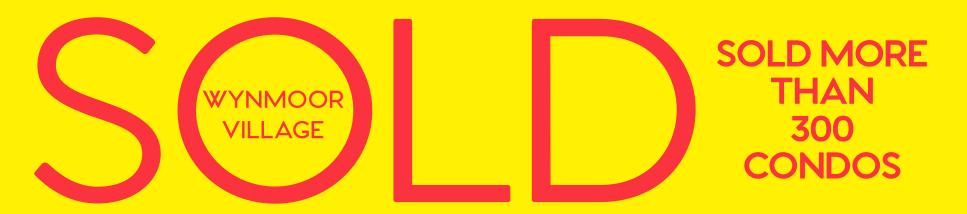
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Traditionally observed on the first Sunday after **Labor Day**, National Grandparents Day is celebrated this year in the US and Canada on Sunday, September 12, 2021.

Latest Scam Alerts and Where to Find Future Ones



Folks 65 and over are among the fastest growing populations to join social media, and this is a fact that has been going on for some time now. When I refer to social media, I'm primarily referencing Facebook. More and more of you are on Facebook, and communication wise, I think that's a good thing.

We use our Facebook page for a myriad of different reasons.

One of which is our Scam Alerts, where we give fans of our page the latest information on some of the scams and frauds we have been seeing. You can find our Facebook page by typing @CoconutCreekPD into Facebook's search engine, which should be at the top left of your computer screen. You can "like" the page and visit it often, which will tell Facebook that you enjoy our content and make it more likely for you to see it at the top of your "news feed."

To catch some of you up, here are a few of the recent scam alerts that have appeared on our page:

CCPD Impersonation Scam:

The bad guys are now impersonating us on the phone in this Coconut Creek Police Department Scam Alert. We had a report this afternoon [August 10] that a 69-year-old Coconut Creek man got a call from someone pretending to be a United States Marshal.

The scammer told the man that his social security number had been used to buy drugs in another state and that he was in trouble. He could either have his bank account frozen or drive to a nearby store, buy gift cards, and then give the numbers on those gift cards to the scammer in order to "fix" the issue.

We've warned you about this type of scam before, but here's where this one gets a little different: The so-called U.S. Marshal then told the man that a Coconut Creek police officer would be calling him to walk him through where to buy the gift cards and how to get them, the scammers, the money. Sure enough, a few moments later, the "police officer" called. The name

of the officer the scammer gave the man didn't match any of ours. The man caught on to the scheme, and proposed to meet the "officer" here at the police department on West Copans Road. The scammer tried more threats to get him to change his mind but the man stood firm.

He drove here to the PD and confirmed we didn't have any officers working here by the name the fraudsters had given him. The scam artists didn't get any of his money. If you get a similar phone call, we wanted you to know to just hang up.

Check Cashing Scams:

Check Cashing Scams are the basis for this Coconut Creek Police Department Scam Alert. A Coconut Creek man recently fell victim to this scam while trying to sell an item on the on-line marketplace, OfferUp. A potential "buyer" contacted him from out of state. The so-called "buyer" sent the victim a check for well over the asking price, explaining it was to help cover the cost of shipping. A little while later, he told the victim he changed his mind and asked him to send the entire amount of money back. After the victim cashed the check and wire transferred the money to the scammer, his bank notified him that the check was fake and it was a scam. The best way to avoid this type of scam if you're selling something on-line is to never accept a check that's more than the asking price.

Amazon Scam:

The Amazon Scam is the basis for this Coconut Creek Police Department Scam Alert. We've talked to several people over the past few weeks who have fallen victim to this scam. In every case, the bad guys called the victims claiming to be representatives from Amazon. They said the victims' Amazon accounts were being used to buy stuff that the victims did not authorize. They told the victims that the only way to fix this was to go to the store and buy gift cards and then give the numbers on the front and back of those cards to them. Of course, once the victims did that, the scammers immediately drained all the money out of the gift cards. In one of the cases, the bad guys stayed on the phone with the victim the entire time while she was making the gift card purchases. Remember that any time someone you don't know asks you to buy gifts cards, it is definitely a scam.

Preparing For The Unexpected

How can we better prepare? It is the question every public safety professional asks and the motivation behind everything we do. Better preparation allows for the best possible response to any incident. Often the incidents or disasters we prepare for are unplanned, happening with little to no warning. However, by training for the unexpected, we remain ready to respond.

While preparation is the foundation of public safety agencies, I can't stress enough how important it is for the public to be prepared. As we observe National Preparedness Month, I recommend creating an actionable plan and setting it in motion. The four weeks of September provide an excellent opportunity to focus on the various aspects of preparedness to help keep you and your loved ones safe.

Week One - Make A Hurricane Plan

In South Florida, it is never the wrong time to prepare for a hurricane. Gather drinking water, batteries, sanitation products and anything you and your family might need to weather a storm. Be sure there are enough

supplies to last at least five days. If staying at home is not an option, know in advance where you will stay during a hurricane. For information about emergency evacuation, transportation, and shelter locations, visit www.broward.org/hurricane.

Week Two – Create A Home Emergency Plan

When an emergency happens at home, ensure all family members know what to do and where to go. Create a communication plan so everyone can keep in contact. Create an evacuation plan and designate a meeting area. Take into consideration the ages and unique



needs of each family member and pet. Ensure the items that may help you in an emergency, such as a fire extinguisher or smoke alarm, are working.

Week Three – Secure Your Sensitive Documents And Valuables

With a comprehensive plan in place, you can now focus on protecting sensitive documents and valuables. First, collect the documents you would need to help identify family members in the event of an emergency. Keep these and other important, sensitive documents, such as insurance papers, at home in a fireproof and waterproof box or safe.

Week Four – Teach Your Loved Ones About Preparedness

Finally, review your plans with family members. Practice evacuation drills. Take courses together to learn survival skills. BSO offers free bleeding control and CPR courses. Sign up for one at https://bit.ly/2Vyg0zC.

If each of us takes the time to prepare and stay prepared, it makes our whole community safer.

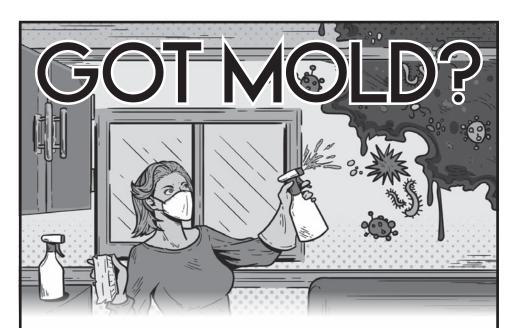

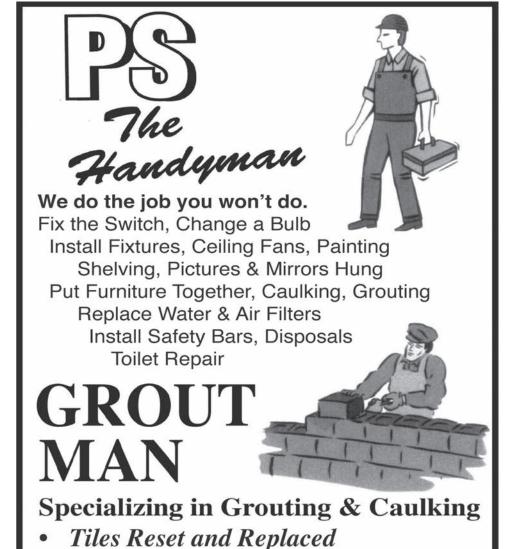

Optimism Holds as Summer Fades, But Can it Continue?

Through much of July, the financial markets seemed as confused about the future of the economy as the rest of us were about the coronavirus. Investors seemed giddy with optimism one week, wary the next week, then giddy again.



That's how most of us are feeling about the pandemic as COVID-19 variant cases spike, and politicians send mixed messages about how cautious we should or shouldn't be. How will this confusion play out as Summer gives way to Fall?

That's a good question considering Labor Day is just a few short weeks away. However, before we look forward, let's look more closely at the past month, which started with all three major market indexes—the Dow, S&P 500, and Nasdaq—hitting new record highs. They all surpassed those peaks again by mid-month. Then came the week of July 15th, which saw sharp declines across the board and ended with all three indexes in the red.* The drop was blamed on new concerns about inflation, which until recently seemed to be the only issue capable of even slightly spooking Wall Street.

I say "until recently" because after rebounding to new peak highs by late July, the markets dropped slightly again to end the month, and this time inflation wasn't the culprit. It was the COVID-19 issue and worries over the extent to which the stubborn virus could start to negatively impact the economy again. After the CDC revised its masking policy to recommend that both unvaccinated and vaccinated people wear masks indoors, several major retailers retightened their own policies. Heading into August, concern about the virus was strong enough to overshadow a new batch of better-than-expected quarterly earnings reports and keep the markets muted.**

Double-Edged Sword

In a way, the spike in COVID-19 variants is a double-edged sword for Wall Street. On one hand, if mask mandates and other restrictions tighten further, it could slow the pace of growth just enough to finally eliminate inflation as a concern. In other words, if tighter restrictions lead to fewer shoppers, travelers, and ticket-buyers again, the drop in demand could hold rising prices in check. On the other hand, if demand drops by too much and the recovery completely stalls, investors could start worrying about the whole economy reversing course.

There are other issues that could have major market impacts in the coming weeks as well. As always, one is the Federal Reserve. Will the Fed stick to its ultra-supportive monetary policy when it meets in September? Or will it shift gears by raising short-term interest rates again, perhaps also pulling the plug on some of its quantitative easing? That's an important question because the markets are still influenced more by Fed policy in many ways than by economic fundamentals. As for *long*-term interest rates, they fell further in July, with the yield on the 10-Year Treasury rate starting August at 1.17%—its lowest level since February.*** That shows pretty clearly the bond market has a much less optimistic view of the future right now than the stock market does—which only adds to all the confusion.

So, what does all this mean for income investors? It means it's important to continue to heed the lessons we learned from the coronavirus crisis the first time around. Those lessons include making sure your financial plan is providing you maximum protection and adequate flexibility. While the Income Model is designed to check both those boxes, if you haven't reviewed your plan in a while, now is a perfect time to do so. With so much uncertainty brewing, you want to make sure your strategy is as defensively strong as it should be should things go south. At the same time, you want to make sure it's flexible enough to allow you to take advantage of any potential new opportunities that may arise if things restabilize and strengthen.

Don't Trust 'Autopilot'

That isn't to say that things are "weak" right now. Compared to a year ago, we're obviously in great shape. In regards to the stock market, as of August 3rd, U.S. stocks had gone 180 trading days without a pullback of at least 5%—one of the longest such stretches in history, according to Goldman Sachs.** That's both the good news and the concerning news, especially when you consider the market is significantly overvalued and probably overdue for another correction of at least 10% or more.

The bottom line is that as COVID-19 continues trying to regain strength and the markets continue looking for direction, it is advisable to continue trying to maximize the value of your income strategy. Again, that means reviewing it if you haven't recently to make sure it's still providing enough protection and giving you the greatest opportunity to increase your income. Remember, NO financial strategy should be left on autopilot, especially at a time when conditions are growing turbulent and forward visibility is low.

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HURRICANE PREPARATION

Hurricane Watches vs. Warnings

A HURRICANE WATCH issued for your part of the coast indicates the possibility that you could experience hurricane conditions within 36 hours. This watch should trigger your family's disaster plan, and protective measures should be initiated, especially those actions that require extra time such as securing a boat, leaving a barrier island, etc.

A HURRICANE WARNING issued for your part of the coast indicates that sustained winds of at least 74 mph are expected within 24 hours or less. Once this warning has been issued, your family should be in the process of completing protective actions and deciding the safest location to be during the storm.

Tropical Storm Watches and Warnings: Takes these alerts seriously. Although Tropical Storms have lower wind speeds than Hurricanes, they often bring life-threatening flooding and dangerous winds. Take precautions!

Other Tips For Seniors

- Stock up on food and water supplies before or early in the Hurricane Season.
- Have at least a one-week supply of your medications (two-week supply is better).
- Stay aware of weather conditions.
- Make all plans in advance.
- If you need to evacuate, team up with a partner, neighbor or relative and plan together.
- Have an easy-to-carry storage container filled with basic necessities available, so in the event of an evacuation, you can grab the container and leave quickly.
- Select a room for your hurricane shelter. Make sure it has no windows, is near the center of your home and has no outside walls.
- If you need to evacuate, listen to the radio for locations of emergency shelters (610 AM, 850 AM, 97.3 FM or 100.7 FM), use travel routes specified by local officials.
- Have a list of emergency phone numbers near your phone. Also, choose one out-of-state friend or relative to contact who will let others know you are safe.
- Make sure to keep your important documents in a waterproof container.
- Turn off all switches in your fuse box but leave air-conditioning on!

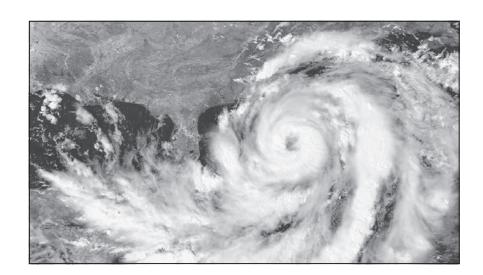
Remember: The Security Emergency Number is 954-978-2663 Should Be The First Number Called For NON-911 Emergencies. For Life-Threatening Emergencies, Always Dial 911 First. (Note: Emergency Vehicles May Not Respond Until The Storm Has Passed)

As with every hurricane season regardless of forecast, knowing the essentials of how to prepare could truly be a life saver. Below is a list of items needed for this season. The season officially starts on June 1st and ends on November 30th.

Planning For Emergencies

Emergency kits are important when you no longer have access to electricity, clean water supply, or are required to evacuate:

- Supply of bottled water (at least a gallon/day, per person)
- Ready to eat nonperishable foods
- Telephone NOT requiring electricity
- Disposable plates/cups/utensils
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- Portable radio with extra batteries
- Extra set of car keys
- Credit cards/cash
- First aid kit
- Garbage bags
- Manual can opener
- Change of clothing/shoes per person
- Extra glasses/contacts
- Whistle to attract attention
- Survival blanket per person
- Special medicines/items for all persons
- Entertainment items (non-electrical, like books, puzzles, etc.)







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If You Have Out of State Trust, Consider Doing Florida Trust

Many of my clients are snowbirds with homes in Florida and another state. Some have a Revocable Living Trust (and Last Will and Testament) in the other state. If you are still a resident of that state and not claiming your homestead in Florida, this article does not apply to you. You should, however, own your Florida property as Trustee of your out of state Trust to avoid probate when you die.

But, if you are a Florida resident and are claiming homestead here, it may be a good idea to create a new Florida Trust and new Florida Last Will and Testament. If you already own your Florida property and your out of state property as Trustee of your current Trust, you can do new Deeds to transfer from one Trust to the other.

There are some legal and practical advantages to owning your Florida homestead property (and any other properties in Florida or elsewhere) in your Florida Trust. Every state has its own laws regarding Wills and Trusts. Typically, a Trust indicates that the laws where the Trust was created apply to the terms of the Trust. If you are now a Florida resident and want to Amend your out of state Trust, there may be confusion or conflict between the laws of the two states. As a Florida attorney, I am hesitant about amending an out of state Trust.

In addition, when you do a Trust, you also do a Last Will and Testament which is commonly referred to as a "pourover" Will. This names the Trust as the beneficiary of any asset owed to your estate upon your death. In Florida, the person named as your Executor or Personal Representative must be a blood relative or a Florida resident. If your out of state Will names someone who is not a blood relative or Florida resident, and you die as a resident of Florida, that out of state Will may be a problem. As a



Florida resident, you should have a Florida Will (regular or pourover) to avoid potential issues when you die. A Florida Will also discusses a "Separate Writing." This allows you, under Florida law, to bequeath personal property (jewelry, furniture, collectibles, etc.) without naming it in the Will. You only need to write it separately, date it and sign it. It does not have to be witnessed or notarized, just kept with your original Florida Will. You can do as many Separate Writings as you wish without a lawyer, as long as each is dated and signed.

If you are a Florida resident claiming homestead here, it is advisable to review your out of state Trust and Will with a Florida attorney. It is best to provide the attorney with your out of state documents at least a few days

before the consultation. If you have other out of state documents, like a Living Will, Designation of Health Care Surrogate and Durable Power of Attorney, these should also be reviewed, since they may not be effective in Florida if you become incapacitated.

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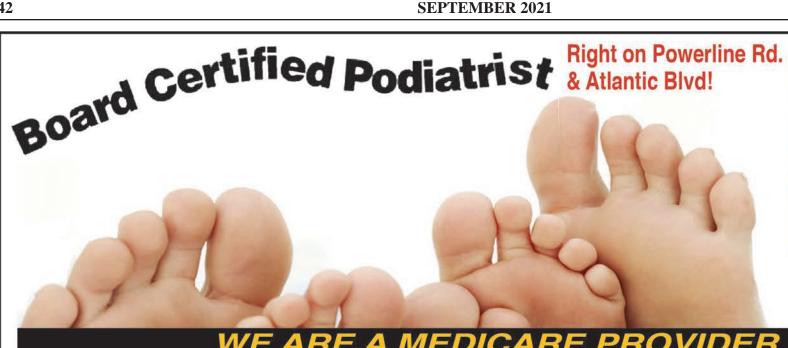
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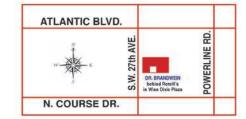
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WYNMOOR Golf and Tips

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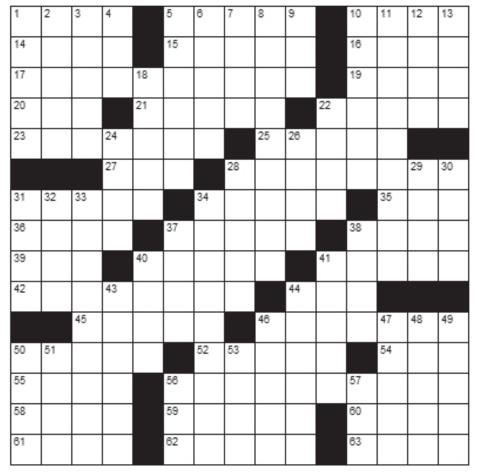

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Be Prepared For Long-Term Care Costs

- The median annual cost for a private room in a nursing home is about \$105,000, and it's almost \$55,000 for home health aide services, according to the insurance company Genworth.

Medicare also may cover very few of these costs. Consequently, it's a good idea to include potential long-term care costs in your planning. While everyone's situation is different, you may want to budget for two to three years' worth of long-term care expenses.

But how can you prepare for these costs? Essentially, you've got three options:

- You could self-insure. If you would like to cover the costs of long-term care out of your own pocket, you'll need to consider a few issues: How will these potential costs affect your family? How might your other goals be affected, or even altered, by your decision to self-insure? Will you have to adjust your investment mix or designate certain investments to help achieve your self-funding objectives? None of these questions should dissuade you from trying to self-fund for long-term care, but they can help you clarify the significance of this choice within your overall financial strategy.
- You could transfer the risk to an insurance company. You could purchase either long-term care insurance or a life insurance policy that provides long-term care benefits in addition to a death benefit. Before obtaining either

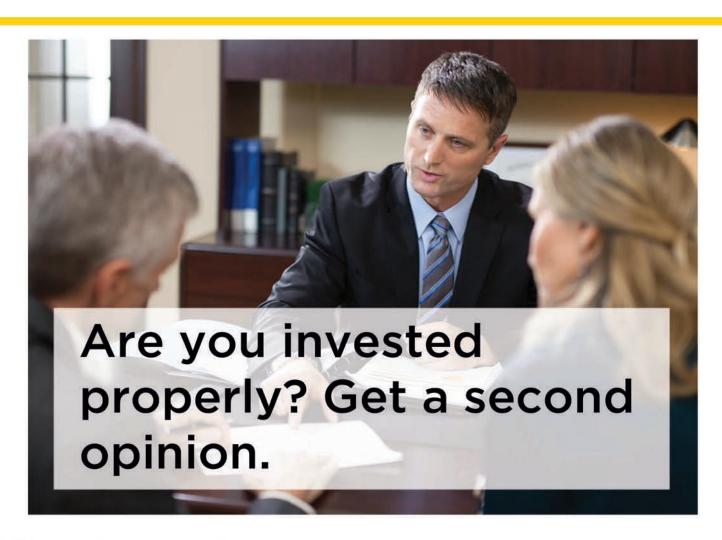
type of policy, though, you'll want to know exactly what the policies cover and when they kick in. Also, be aware that the younger you are when you buy a policy, the lower the premiums. On the other hand, if you buy a straight long-term care policy when you're young, you could end up paying premiums for many years for coverage you may never need. A financial advisor can help you evaluate all your insurance options and recommend which one, if any, is appropriate for your situation.

• You could combine self-insurance with an insurance policy. You could plan to self-insure for long-term care for a limited time – perhaps one year's worth of anticipated costs – and then buy enough insurance for additional expenses. This technique could involve some juggling on your part, in terms of where to direct your money, but it might prove to be a workable compromise between self-insurance and putting all your long-term care resources into an insurance policy.

Which of these methods is right for you? There's no one "right" answer for everyone. But whichever route you choose, you'll be helping to protect yourself – and possibly your grown children or other family members – from the potentially huge costs of long-term care. And that protection can help brighten your outlook throughout your retirement.

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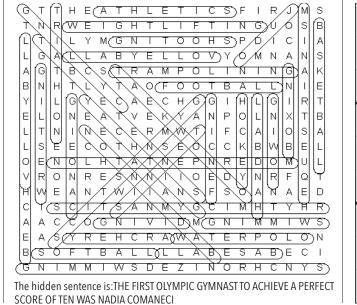

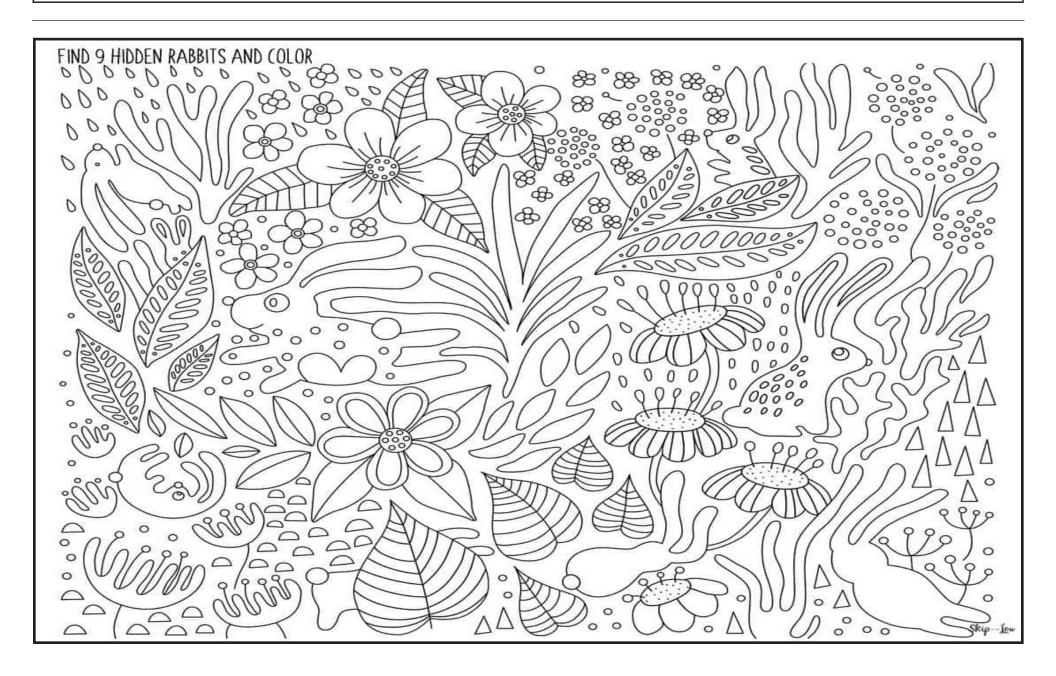
